

## Highest Testing Herd in Entire State of Oregon Fed From Tum-A-Lum Silo



To begin with, Henry Helmholtz of Redmond had the highest herd in the state of Oregon. His 14 Holsteins walked away from 1600 cows in the test and won first place in the November Record, averaging 953.7 lbs. of milk and 44.3 lbs of butterfat in 30 days. The next highest herd averaged only 555.1 lbs of milk and 31.1 lbs of butterfat. Mr. Helmholtz fed his cows Sunflower Ensilage and reports that the cows relish it as much, if not more, than corn—sunflowers went 25 tons per acre, while corn went 8 tons.

### He Likes Irrigon

C. P. Boies, who with his family came from Lower Bridge and settled in Irrigon two months ago, was transacting business in Hermiston Saturday. The gentleman on his arrival in the little west extension town became so enthused with the possibilities for expansion which he noted there immediately cast around in search of a small tract of land on which to make his permanent home, with the result that he separated Farmer Smith, of corn growing fame, from his six acre well improved place situated near the heart of the city. Mr. Boies has all the earmarks of an energetic farmer, and being perfectly satisfied with conditions in his new home, feels that he will make progress in the dairy, chicken and hog raising line of diversified farming that he has decided to take up. Later on he intends to invest in more land in Irrigon.

### ROSE FESTIVAL TO BE HELD AGAIN THIS YEAR

Included in the elaborate plans for a monster celebration of the Victory Rose Festival in Portland, June 11, 12 and 13, 1919, is a flight by military airplanes from the Government field at Los Angeles to Portland, where an air meet is to be held.

The Festival directors have secured encouragement from the War Department and final arrangements will be made next month, it is expected. General Brice B. Disque, who was in command of the spruce work for the Government, endorsed the project and the War Department has indicated that the wishes of the directors will be met when the time comes.

The Victory Festival will excel any that Portland has offered in the past for it is to be a dual event. The men returning from the great war will find a tremendous welcome and the usual features of the annual festival will be augmented by a street carnival extending over many blocks and a festival center where the flowers of the world will bloom in profusion during the three days of tribute to the Rose.

A series of military pageants will be included in the program and the annual inspection of the Portland police department, coupled with an extensive demonstration of safety first work, will be one of the features for the opening day.

The directors have offered a cash prize of \$15 for the best slogan of seven words and a \$25 cash prize for the most appropriate poster. All entries must be submitted to the festival headquarters, 218 Pittock Block, Oregon, not later than 5 p. m. March 31st.

### Lime-Sulfur Controls Mildew

Lime-sulfur spray, 1 part commercial strength to 25 parts water, applied to gooseberry bushes just as the leaves break from the buds, will control mildew on well kept plants, says Prof. H. P. Barrass, O. A. C. Spraying must cover both sides of the leaves. If the bushes have been neglected a second application, 1-40, just before the blossoms burst, will be required. If badly diseased a third application, 1-50 just after the fruit is set, will be needed.

**PUBLIC NOTICE, UMATILLA PROJECT, OREGON, DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, WASHINGTON, MARCH 12, 1919. 1. ANNUAL OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE CHARGE.**—In pursuance of Section 4 of the Reclamation Act of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat., 388), and of acts amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto, particularly The Reclamation Extension Act of August 12, 1914, (38 Stat., 986), announcement is hereby made that the annual operation and maintenance charge for the irrigation season of 1919 and thereafter until further notice against all lands of the Umatilla Project, Oregon, under public notice, shall be as follows: For lands of the West Extension a minimum charge of \$2.00 per irrigable acre, whether water is used thereon or not, which minimum charge will entitle the water user to three acre-feet of water per irrigable acre, and for all other lands a minimum charge of \$2.00 per irrigable acre, whether water is used thereon or not, which minimum charge will entitle the water user to four acre-feet of water per irrigable acre. Additional supplies will be furnished for all lands at the following rates: The first acre-foot for 50 cents, the next acre-foot for 75 cents, and each acre-foot thereafter for \$1.00. Provided, that for lands seeded during the current irrigation season to alfalfa for the first time, the additional supply of water will be furnished for 25 cents per acre-foot. All operation and maintenance charges under the project will be due and payable on March 1 following the irrigation season; but where water right application is made for public land entered under the reclamation law after June 15, or where water right application is made after August 1, for land in private ownership, no operation and maintenance charge will be made for water delivered during the remainder of the irrigation season in which water right application is made.
