### 17,000 PREACHERS TO HELP LIBERTY LOAN DRIVE

News comes from Portland that the services of the entire Methodist centenary organization, together with 17,000 Methodist pastors and 75,000 Methodist minute men, were pledged to the government to put over the Victory Liberty loan at a session of the National centenary committee which has just ended at Columbus, O., according to a recent statement in that city by Dr. Charles S. Bowen, executive secretary for the northwest for the \$105,000,000 centenary movement, who with his associate, Dr. A. L. Howarth, returned from Columbus a few days ago.

Not to put any obstacle in the way of the government, the Methodist intensive financial drive was postponed until May 18-25, in order to give precedence to the Victory loan. The Methodists also placed themselves on record against any conflicting conventions during the loan drive.

"Wherever regular services or special centenary meetings are held in local communities, opportunity is to be given to the loan committee to present the loan campaign and to sell bonds," said Dr. Bowen. "The centenary publicity department is to get behind the Liberty loan tooth and nail."

"The Methodist press is to strain every effort to promote the loan. A special edition of Missiles, the organ of the Methodist five-minute men, is to be issued at once and the minute men's services are tendered to the government. Throughout the northwest, we shall bend every effort to make the Victory loan campaign ours just as much as if it were the Methodist centenary drive. Every area secretary from the 29 areas of the centenary were present. There was unanimous approval of the plan.

"Christianity and Methodism are

heartily behind the loan. Our churches are open for presentation of the loan. Our organization is ready to be used for the loan. I suppose this is the first time any great religious movement has been turned over bodily to the government. This means that 4,000,000 Methodists will get behind the Victory loan even with greater enthusiasm than they might have originally planned."

### Calls Silo Green Pasture

"A silo is a green pasture under cover, which can be used any time of the year," declares E. L. Westover, extension dairy specialist of O. A. C. He shows by analysis that in water, nitrogen, crude fiber, ether extract and ash, ensilage and blue grass are quite similar, though the protein of the grass is twice that of the silage. No other farm building will pay so large a dividend as the silo, he asserts.
