The Libyan desert has enjoyed its distinctive name from time immemorial. . . . It forms part of the great Sahara, which dominates North Africa from the Atlantic to the Red sea—a world in itself, although its characteristics are reproduced, almost within identical latitudes, in a deep zone girdling the earth.

On account of the scarcity of coal there will probably be a large amount of wood used as fuel this winter. Use all the waste timber, dead and dying trees for this purpose and be sure to conserve the ashes for garden fertilizer. They are rich in plant food, particularly potash.

It is said that exposure to weather causes greater destruction to to farm implements than using them. Avoid this loss by storing all machinery and tools properly under shelter before winter sets in.
