

PETITION

In the County Court of the State of Oregon for Umatilla County. In the Matter of the Organization of Hermiston Irrigation District Umatilla County, State of Oregon.

To the Honorable County Court of Umatilla County, Oregon: The undersigned petitioners respectfully show:

That petitioners are more than fifty or a majority of the owners of land irrigated or susceptible of irrigation within the boundaries hereinafter described and desired to provide for the construction of works for the irrigation of the same and to provide for the reconstruction, betterment, extension, purchase, operation or maintenance of works already constructed and for the assumption as principal or guarantor of indebtedness on account of district lands to the United States under the federal reclamation laws, and petitioners do now propose the organization of an irrigation district to be known as Hermiston Irrigation District, within Umatilla County, State of Oregon, under the provision of Chapter 357 of the general laws of Oregon for 1917 and acts amendatory thereof.

That the lands of your petitioners are included within what is known as the Umatilla Project built by the United States Reclamation Service and said lands are susceptible of irrigation from the waters of the Umatilla River as a common source and all of said lands are located within Umatilla County, Oregon.

That the boundaries of said proposed irrigation district are described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the west line of Section 3, Tp. 4 N. R. 29 E. W. M., where the south boundary line of the right of way of the "A" canal of the Umatilla project as now permanently located and constructed by the U. S. Reclamation Service intersects the west line of said Section 3, at a point southerly 385 feet, more or less, from the northwest corner of the SW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of said Section 3; thence running in a southerly and westerly direction along the said boundary line of the right of way of said "A" canal a distance of .86 miles, more or less, to the east line of the SW 1/4 of SW 1/4 of Sec. 20 in Tp. 4 N. R. 28 E. W. M., at a point distant 290 feet, more or less, and in a northerly direction from the southeast corner of the said SW 1/4 of SW 1/4 of said Section 20; thence running in a southerly direction 290 feet, more or less, to the southeast corner of the SW 1/4 of SW 1/4 of said Section 20; thence running along the south line of Sections 20 and 19, Tp. 4 N. R. 28 E. W. M. in a westerly direction to the southwest corner of the SE 1/4 of SE 1/4 of said Section 19; thence running in a southerly direction along the east line of the NW 1/4 of NE 1/4 of Sec. 30, Tp. 4 N. R. 28 E. W. M. 1200 feet more or less to a point on the east bank of the Umatilla river; thence running in a northerly direction along the east bank of the Umatilla river eight miles, more or less, to the north boundary of Section 4, Tp. 4 N. R. 28 E. W. M. to a point westerly and distant 290 feet, more or less, from the Northwest corner of the NE 1/4 of NE 1/4 of said Section 4 and at the southeast corner of the Government Reserve for the Three Miles Falls diversion dam on said river; thence running in a northerly direction along the east boundary line of said Reserve two miles, more or less, to a point on the south boundary line of Section 21, Tp. 5 N. R. 28 E. W. M. westerly and distant 670 feet more or less from the Southwest corner of the SE 1/4 of SW 1/4 of Section 21; thence running in a westerly direction along the south boundary line of Section 21 to a point on the north boundary line of the Government reserve westerly and distant 760 feet, more or less, from the said southwest corner of the SE 1/4 of SW 1/4 of said Section 21, Tp. 5 N. R. 28 E. W. M.; thence running in a northerly direction along the east boundary line of the Umatilla river to the northwest corner of the said Section 21; thence running in an easterly direction along the north boundary line of the said Section 21, 2640 feet, more or less, to the southwest corner of the SE 1/4 of Section 16, Tp. 5 N. R. 28 E. W. M.; thence running in a northerly direction along the center line of said Section 16, 2640 feet, more or less, to the center of Section 16, Tp. 5 N. R. 28 E. W. M.; thence in an easterly direction 2640 feet, more or less, to the northeast corner of the SE 1/4 of Section 16, Tp. 5 N. R. 28 E. W. M.; thence running in a northerly direction along the east boundary line of Section 16, 660 feet, more or less, to the northwest corner of the S 1/2 of SW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of Section 15, Tp. 5 N. R. 28 E. W. M.; thence running in an easterly direction along the north line of the said S 1/2 of NW 1/4 of said Section 15, 1320 feet, more or less, to the northeast corner of the said S 1/2 of NW 1/4 of said Section 15; thence running in a northerly direction along the west line of the SE 1/4 of NW 1/4 of said Section 15, 660 feet, more or less, to the northwest corner of the SE 1/4 of NW 1/4 of said Section 15; thence in an easterly direction along the north line of the said SE 1/4 of NW 1/4 of said Section 15, 1320 feet, more or less, to the northeast corner of the said SE 1/4 of NW 1/4 of said Section 15; thence in a southerly direction along the east line of the said SE 1/4 of NW 1/4 of said Section 15, 660 feet, more or less, to the north boundary of the right of way of Lateral "O" of the Umatilla project as now permanently surveyed and constructed by the U. S. Reclamation Service; thence running in an easterly and southerly direction along said boundary line of the right of way of the said Lateral "O", a distance of 2.33 miles, more or less, to the north line of the S 1/2 of Section 24, Tp. 5 N. R. 28 E. W. M. at a point distant 360 feet, more or less, and voting place at Hermiston, Oregon, in an easterly direction from the center of said Section 21; thence

along the center line of the said Section 24 and the Section 19, Tp. 5 N. R. 29 E. W. M. 7560 feet, more or less, to the northeast corner of the SE 1/4 of the said Section 19; thence southerly along the east line of the said SE 1/4 of said Section 19, 2640 feet, more or less, to the southeast corner of said Section 19; thence easterly along the north line of Section 29, Tp. 5 N. R. 29 E. W. M. 2640 feet, more or less, to the northeast corner of the NW 1/4 of said Section 29; thence southerly along the center line of said Section 29 a distance of 2640 feet, more or less, to the center of said Section 29; thence easterly along the north line of the SE 1/4 of the said Section 29, 2640 feet, more or less, to the northeast corner of the said SE 1/4 of said Section 29; thence northerly along the west line of the SW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of Section 28, Tp. 5 N. R. 29 E. W. M. 1320 feet, more or less, to the northwest corner of the said SW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of said Section 28; thence easterly along the north line of the S 1/2 of NW 1/4 of said Section 28, 2640 feet, more or less, to the northeast corner of the said S 1/2 of NW 1/4 of Section 28; thence northerly along the west line of the NW 1/4 of NE 1/4 of said Section 28 1320 feet, more or less, to the northwest corner of the NE 1/4 of said Section 28; thence easterly along the north line of the NW 1/4 of NE 1/4 of said Section 28, 1320 feet, more or less, to the northeast corner of the said NW 1/4 of NE 1/4 of said Section 28; thence northerly along the east line of the SE 1/4 of SE 1/4 of Section 21, Tp. 5 N. R. 29 E. W. M., 1320 feet, more or less, to the northwest corner of the SE 1/4 of SE 1/4 of Section 21; thence easterly along the north line of the said SE 1/4 of SE 1/4 of said Section 21 and the north line of the S 1/2 of Section 22, Tp. 5 N. R. 29 E. W. M. and the north line of the S 1/2 of SW 1/4 of Section 23, Tp. 5 N. R. 29 E. W. M. 1.75 miles, more or less, to intersect the half section line running north and south through the center of Section 23 in said township at the northeast corner of SE 1/4 of SW 1/4 of said Section 23; thence running in a southerly direction on said north and south center lines a distance of 1.5 miles, more or less, to the northwest corner of the SW 1/4 of NE 1/4 of Section 35, in said township; thence easterly along the north line of said SW 1/4 of NE 1/4 and along the north line of the S 1/2 of NE 1/4 of said Section 35 and continuing along the north line of the S 1/2 of N 1/2 of Section 36, in said township, and along the north line of the S 1/2 of N 1/2 of Section 31 in Tp. 5 N. R. 30 E. W. M. to the east line of said Section 31; thence southerly a distance of three-quarter miles, more or less, to the southeast corner of said Section 31; thence in a westerly direction along the south line of said Section 31 a distance of one mile, more or less, to the northeast corner of Section 1, Tp. 4 N. R. 29 E. W. M.; thence in a southerly direction along the east line of said Section 1 and along the east line of Section 12, in said last named township, a distance of 1.75 miles, more or less, to the northeast corner of the SE 1/4 of SE 1/4 of Section 12; thence westerly one-half mile, more or less, to the southwest corner of the NW 1/4 of SE 1/4 of said Section 12; thence in a northerly direction along the west line of said NW 1/4 of SE 1/4 of said Section 12, a distance of one-quarter mile, more or less, to the center of said Section 12; thence in a westerly direction one quarter mile, more or less, to the southeast corner of SW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of said Section 12; thence northerly along the east line of said SW 1/4 of NW 1/4 a distance of one-quarter mile, more or less, to the northeast corner of the NW 1/4 of NW 1/4 of said Section 12; thence in a westerly direction along the north line of said SW 1/4 of NW 1/4 a distance of one-quarter mile, more or less, to the southeast corner of the NE 1/4 of NE 1/4 of Section 11, in said township, thence northerly one-quarter mile, more or less, to the northeast corner of said Section 11; thence in a westerly direction along the north line of said Section 11 and along the north line of Section 10, in said township, a distance of two miles, more or less, to the southwest corner of Section 3 in said Township 4 N. R. 29 E. W. M.; thence northerly along the west line of said Section 3, a distance of 3575 feet, more or less, to intersect the south boundary line of the "A" canal right of way, the place of beginning.

EXCEPTIONS

Saving and excepting the following described tracts of land lying within the above described boundary, to-wit:

In Township 4 N. R. 28 E. W. M. All of the NE 1/4 of SE 1/4 of Section 10, and all of the N 1/2 of SW 1/4 of Section 11, being a part of the City of Hermiston.

All that portion of the NW 1/4 of Section 10 lying within and above the present located and constructed laterals of the "D" line system surrounding the Hermiston Butte.

In Township 5 N. R. 28 E. W. M. All of the SW 1/4 of Section 27, all of the SE 1/4 of Section 27 lying west of the boundary line of the right of way of the R-j and R-h laterals and all of the NW 1/4 of Section 27 lying south and west of the south and west boundary of the right of way of the R-h lateral; all of the E 1/2 of E 1/2 of Section 28 and all of the W 1/2 of E 1/2 of Section 28 lying south and east of the south and east boundary of the right of way of the R lateral; all of the E 1/2 of NE 1/4 of Section 33 lying east and north of the east and north boundary of the right of way of the R lateral; all of the E 1/2 of Section 21 and all of the W 1/2 of SE 1/4 of Section 21, and all of the E 1/2 of E 1/2 of NE 1/4 of Section 21, the above tracts known as the "Umatilla Buttes."

That it is the intention of petitioners to elect the first Board of Directors from the District at large and to establish the main office and voting place at Hermiston, Oregon, within the said proposed irrigation district.

WHEREFORE, your petitioners pray that all of the said lands included within the limits of the proposed boundaries as described aforesaid and excluding the exceptions mentioned therein, be organized into an irrigation district to be known as Hermiston Irrigation District, under the provisions of Chapter 357 of the general laws of Oregon for 1917 and acts amendatory thereof. Diamond Cutters.

The boy who aspires to be a diamond cutter has to enter into indentures of apprenticeship for seven years. He becomes a wage earner right away, however. As he progresses his earnings increase, and there are youths not out of their apprenticeship earning as much as \$19.46 and \$21.90 a week. The experienced craftsmen may earn anything up to \$48.65. The experiment of teaching discharged and disabled soldiers has been quite a success. The men are put on a wage-earning basis at once, though for the first 12 months the value of their labor is practically negligible. Thenceforward, however, an apt learner will go ahead rapidly. There are fixed time rates, but a production bonus makes earnings mainly dependent on individual ability and industry.
