### THANKSGIVING DAY

Thursday of next week is Thanksgiving Day. On that day people generally will offer thanks for the many blessings bestowed on them during the past 12 months. One of the greatest blessings for which this offering will be made is that the world war is at an end, and were there some way that Divine Providence could do away with the unrest that now prevails all over this and other countries, then should all be doubly thankful.

The origin of Thanksgiving Day extends back a few centuries, and came from a meeting held by the Pilgrim Fathers at Plymouth, Mass., in 1621, at that time the settlers and their Indian guests feasting on wild turkey and deer.

During the revolution Thanksgiving was a national institution, annually recommended by congress, but after the general Thanksgiving for peace in 1784, there was no national recommendation until 1789, when Washington, by request of congress, recommended a day of thanksgiving for the adoption of the constitution.

Washington issued a second proclamation of thanksgiving in 1795, on account of the suppression of insurrection. There was thanksgiving for peace in 1815, until which time Thanksgiving had been mainly a New England custom.

During the Civil War, 1863-64, Lincoln issued proclamations recommending annual Thanksgivings. Since then a proclamation has been issued annually.
