## LOCAL TRAIN SERVICE HAS BEEN CURTAILED

Last Sunday witnessed another change in the train service through this city. On that day passenger trains Nos. 20 and 21, known as the Umattilla-Baker swing around, was discontinued, and Nos. 1 and 2, which operated over the cutoff between Portland and Walla Walla, was cut to a run only as far out of Portland as Biggs. The curtailment of this train service came through necessity to conserve fuel, and does not mean that it is permanent.

Trains Nos. 4, 6 and 18, eastbound, and 5, 19 and 17, westbound, remain on the same old schedule, but none of them are running anywhere near true to form lately on account of the storms. As a result no one here knows when they can go any place by train, and when they do they are in the same fix if they wish to come back.

No censure can be attached to the railroad management, however, for they are doing their utmost to maintain a semblance of efficiency under the trying ordeal of shortness of fuel, combined with the bad weather conditions now prevailing all over Oregon.

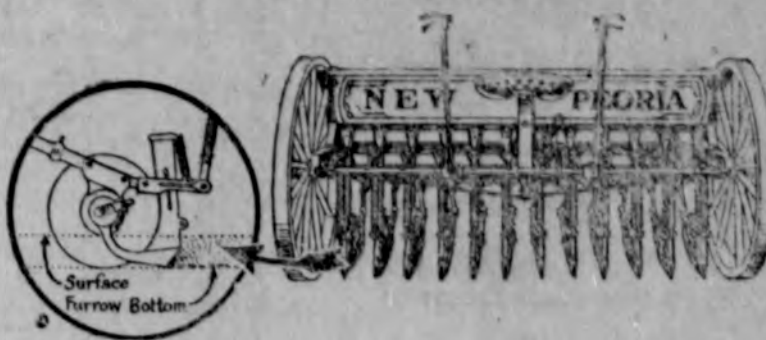
## LEGISLATURE TO CON-VENE NEXT MONTH

Word comes from Salem to the effect that Governor Olcott has announced that he will call a special session of the legislature on the second Monday in January.

His decision to call a special session it is said was reached after he had been informed by members of the state industrial accident commission that the present low rates of compensation are inadequate to meet the needs of injured workmen who have families dependent on them for support.

It is stated that the governor was advised by the commission that a large number of complaints are being received from injured workmen who are dependent upon their compensation allowance for meeting living expenses while they are incapacitated for work. These workmen say it is impossible for them to meet the bare living costs with the compensation allowed.

## FEED ALL BIRDS, BUT QUAIL ESPECIALLY

Pheasants fare better than the quail, being a stronger and hardier bird and more able to take care of themselves in this kind of weather. They will forage for an existence in any kind of weather, but this the quail cannot do, and therefore need the help of the rancher at this time.

SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE

A rousing Farm Bureau meeting was held Wednesday evening. The membership campaign is progressing satisfactorily, over 400 farmers now being enrolled in Morrow county. A literary and musical program preceded the business session, and a supper of coffee, cake and sandwiches followed. Much interest is being taken in the rabbit poisoning campaign and in cooperative marketing of the alfalfa hay crop of the project. Nine cars have been offered at \$26 per ton F. O. B. Boardman, and it is possible that more might be had. The tendency of the market is upward. Good roads came in for a just share of the discussion and some plan to make the amount recently voted by a 10 mill special tax immediately available is under consideration. A committee will meet with the county court to see what can be done.

A meeting of the Federal Farm Loan Association considered loans aggregating \$33,000, and this matter is being rapidly put in working order. Several places are being proved up, and as title from the government is received loans for improvements are requested.

Eighty shares in the Community Bull Association have been sold, and yards and pens will be built at I. Skonby's for the proper handling of stock.

J. C. Ballenger is placing a complete stock in his new hardware and furniture store this week.

Work on the new school building has slackened somewhat owing to the inclement weather.

School will close December 23 for the Christmas vacation and will resume again January 5th.
