The furnaces for the new school building were put in operation for the first time on Tuesday, and they are very satisfactory.

The Boardman local of the Morrow County Farm Bureau held a very successful meeting last Monday night, the main topics being rabbit control, which is being very successfully waged in this section; good roads, a special meeting to be called soon, and the discussion of the idea that officials of the organization, local, county or state, should be bona fide agriculturists.

Mrs. Earl Cramer, who has been suffering from an attack of pneumonia, is now improving rapidly.

Some tools and equipment are being ordered for shopwork and an elementary course in cobbling for the boys of the school is to be started.

Bulletins have been sent to the homes of the district in the interest of the Boy and Girl Club work. It was brought out at the state teachers' association that the chief measure for the success of the movement lay in the encouragement and backing the child received from his parents, and that the work is one of the best courses given pupils of rural schools.

The Boardman Farm Bureau will change its regular meeting night to the week-end—either Friday or Saturday—so that more can attend and the county agent be present oftener.
