Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held within the precincts of Irrigon and Boardman within the West Extension Irrigation District on Tuesday, the twenty-fourth day of February, 1920, between the hours of eight o'clock in the morning and five o'clock in the afternoon of said day for the purpose of determining whether or not that certain contract between the United States of America and the West Extension Irrigation District approved by the Board of Directors and filed in the office of the Board at Hermiston, Oregon, on the sixth day of January, 1920, shall be authorized and entered into by the Board of Directors, and which said contract sets forth the maximum amount of money payable to the United States for construction purposes, or in the assumption of liability for district lands for such purposes, exclusive of penalties and interest, in the amount of \$1,100,000, and also provides for the substitution of the taxing power of the district in lieu of the existing liens by individual contracts and other provisions, which said contract in full may be seen by any landowner or other person interested at the office of the district in the U. 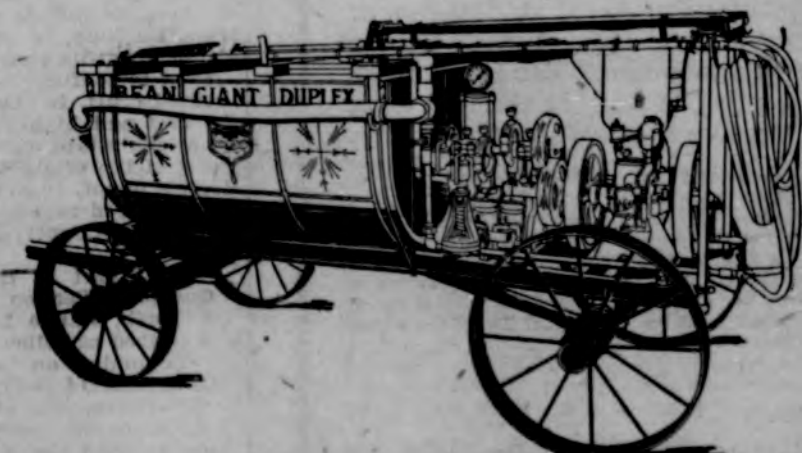
