## Grow Your Own Fertilizer!

Nitrates, Potash and Humus  
While Raising Your Cash Crops it can be done in Orchards, in Corn or with early potatoes by sowing

### Hairy Vetch

Never winter kills; can be sown in spring or fall, as orchard crop will reseed itself abundantly. Sown in July after early potatoes, or in corn at last cultivation affords one or two tons (dry) matter to plow under in spring; may be pastured in winter, especially if sown with wheat or rye. Best of all legumes in gathering nitrogen from the air, being a third richer than alfalfa and one-half richer than clover; exceeds all other legumes also in making potash available. A ton and a half of dry hairy vetch, including the roots, which is a fair yield after corn or early potatoes, and much less than a year's growth in the orchard, contains as much nitrates as 620 pounds of sodium nitrate or one and a half tons of bone meal; and also contains eighty pounds of potash. It also supplies nearly an equal value of humus, which no commercial fertilizer except manure can furnish. 40 pounds to 50 pounds per acre or 25 to 30 pounds if sown with grain.

Except where vetch or peas have recently grown luxuriantly, inoculation is always advisable. Commercial bacteria culture can be used, or inoculating soil with instructions can be furnished for \$1 extra.
