INFORMATION ON WORK OF COW TESTING

The following letter will be of interest to all project farmers interested in better dairy stock, and the letter was given to us by A. W. Agnew who has been a staunch believer in the cow testing idea for some time.

"Mr. A. W. Agnew, Hermiston, Oregon. Dear Mr. Agnew: Professor Brandt called my attention to the fact that last year you wrote in regarding testing work in your locality, making inquiry as to whether or not the flat rate charged at that time could be extended to Eastern Oregon.

"I have just recently taken over the superintendency of the official testing and we have been reorganizing the work. The new rates to be charged for official testing go into force June 1, and I am having sent to you data under which the work is being conducted at the present time in Oregon. Many changes will be taking place in the work and it will be some weeks until we have had things gone over in the way we desire. After talking with Professor Brandt we felt that we could extend this flat rate to your locality as well as to the other parts of the state. While realizing with just one herd the overhead traveling expenses will bring a loss to the fund, however we feel that we can get others started in your locality through your taking up the work and it would only be a short time until there would be no loss in this work.

"If you are interested in taking up the work, I would be very glad to hear from you as soon as possible as to your plans so that we can arrange accordingly. Being a Jersey breeder, you will note from the price schedule that the rate will be \$10.00 per test.

The Oregon Agricultural College sends out the following information:

Fees charged for conducting official tests: These fees apply to everyone regardless of distance from the college: Each one and one-half day test, (Guernsey), \$8.00; each two-day test, (Jersey, Ayrshire), \$10.00; each 2 and one-half day test, (Holstein-Guernsey), \$11.50. All other testing at \$3.50 per day plus traveling time to and from farm and all necessary traveling expenses incurred.

The above flat rates include traveling time and expenses unless an unusual expense is necessary in making a test.

Official testing of dairy cattle is a test for milk and butterfat production under the supervision of a qualified representative of an agricultural college. The Oregon Agricultural College is responsible to the breed association and to the public for the authenticity of the official records of Oregon.

The benefits are: (1). Increases the value of the cow, her offspring and other near relatives; (2). Pro-

vides a basis for proper selection, breeding and feeding, so essential for developing a high producing and profitable herd; (3). A stimulation of personal pride in the development of the kind of dairy stock which will improve the breed.

All prominent breeders must do official testing eventually. Why not start now?

To start official testing: (1) Write to the secretary of your breed association applying for permission to test and asking for a supply of breed blanks to be sent to you. (2) Write to the superintendent of official testing, O. A. C., Corvallis, Oregon, asking for a supervisor, giving the breed and number of animals to be tested and the length of time a supervisor is desired. (3) Have the following supplies on hand: An enclosed Babcock testing machine, in smooth running condition, and sulphuric acid. The college furnishes all other supplies. (4) Give the college at least two weeks notice to insure a supervisor.
