Six hundred eight hats were made by women in Benton, Lincoln, Coos, Jackson, and Umatilla counties, at an actual net cost of \$514.13. This work was done in connection with college extension service millinery schools which were attended by 1700 persons. The hats made averaged 85 cents in cost. This represented a saving of \$4,670.20, based on the commercial value of the hats—at least this was the estimate of the millinery agent.
