LARGE SAVING TO FARMERS EFFECTED BY COOPERATIVES

Cooperative farmers' associations in the northern and western states, whose organization was promoted by county agents, last year effected a saving to the members of \$5,434,000, according to reports made to the States Relations Service, United States Department of Agriculture. The governing principle in all activities on the part of county agents sharing in cooperative movements has been not to act as the direct business agent of the farmer or an organized group, but to assist farmers in determining what form of local organization is desirable and to secure expert assistance, when available, in organization methods. The county agent also helps guard the community against over organization and wherever practicable advocates the use of existing agencies. The cooperative associations which the county agents have helped form have had to do both with production and distribution and include cooperative grain elevators, creameries, and livestock selling associations.

Grand Jury Indicts Five Criminals

Percy Collier and Edward Clark have been appointed by the court to defend the men and report that Henderson and Stoop, known as Patterson and Anderson have their own counsel, but Kerby, Bancroft and Laffeban, (Owens, Hart and Rathie,) will be defended by Collier and Clark.

The two men who were said to have Indian blood now say they have not, and the man who has been known as Rathie, is now known to have a record as a dangerous criminal and the same is said of members of his family. He is said to be of the worst type of Russian German.
