ALFALFA, NOT APPLES

In the issue of September 10, of the Portland Oregonian, we notice an article headed, "Good Hay Crop Secured—First Cutting of Alfalfa Heavier Than Usual—Small Damage Done by Summer Rains." Down towards the bottom of the article we read Umatilla county's report: "Umatilla—Fifty per cent apple crop in Milton-Freewater district, where most of apples are grown. Failure, to 25 per cent crop, at Hermiston, making average for county about 45 per cent normal."

We respectfully call the Oregonian's attention to the head lines in their article. "Good Hay Crop Secured—First Cutting of Alfalfa Heavier Than Usual." They speak the truth about Hermiston and the Umatilla project. Apples are a secondary consideration here. Alfalfa is the great product of the west end of Umatilla county.
