hives and figures on about 700 this year. These have been pretty well scattered over the Newlands project, usually on dry sandy knolls that are worthless for anything else. The bee industry has been given considerable attention in this valley for a number of years, and carloads of fine honey are shipped out every season.

The bee man says that if enough bees were provided to gather all the honey of Lahontan Valley it would be worth as much as the entire alfalfa crop. He may be correct, and if so it would be some honey, for the alfalfa crop the past year is estimated to have been worth about \$1,000,000.

This appears to indicate that some one is letting a very valuable crop go to waste every year. Honey on the Government projects is gathered largely from alfalfa, which blooms almost constantly, and it is said the

honey gathered from it is unsurpassed in quality.
