Little Dorena McFall, who has been threatened with pneumonia, is improving.

A light snow which fell Sunday is fast disappearing with a warm wind. The river which has been quite low is again rising.

Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Jackson motorized to Pendleton on Friday to attend the funeral of little James McPherson. Mrs. Jackson is a sister of Harvey McPherson.

Mrs. W. J. Jackson who has been visiting with her daughter at Wardner for the past few weeks did not return home this week as expected, owing to a slight illness.

**Farm and Home Pointers**  
Only with high-class breeding swine is there enough difference in favor of oats over barley in producing better frame and legs to justify the growing of the more expensive feed.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

Commercial patterns for home making of garments should be tested by measuring and comparing with the individual measurements of the person. Such corrections as may be necessary should then be made on the paper pattern.—Home economics, O. A. C.

Peas and oats are the most palatable of all soiling crops grown in the coast districts. Planted in February the crop will be ready for use July 1. Successive planting every 15 days up to the middle of March will afford food till August 15.—Experiment Station, O. A. C.

Peach leaf curl control to be certain must be undertaken by spraying with Bordeaux mixture, 6-6-50, not later than February 10. Every bud must be covered. Once is enough if put on right, and both tree and crop will be spared from curl throughout the season.—Plant pathology, O. A. C.

Many rainfall farmers of western Oregon have gone back to the intermountain regions of Montana and Idaho looking for new land, forgetting the marshes and tideland in their own back yard, which, if drained, will become the most profitable land in the state for such crops as garden truck and vegetables, and small fruit and berries. Drainage specialists will help them find out when and how the land may be reclaimed.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

Better results are obtained when fowls are fed according to appetite than according to rule. There are no best poultry feeds or rations except those that supply the necessary food elements most economically. Hens can do well on a whole grain ration.—Poultry, O. A. C.

**Clothing Projects Save Money**  
Schools for training leaders in special phases of the clothing project conducted in Jackson and Coos counties were attended by 58 women representing 19 communities. On the 70 garments made a saving of \$135.36, was reported. The kind of work in which most women of the communities are interested were done, and the women who attended the schools are helping their neighbors. One woman came six miles on horseback, roads being impassable for vehicles.

**Club Products Valuable**  
The value of the output of Oregon club members in 1920 was \$111,585.60, the final report of H. C. Seymour, club leader, shows. The net profits on the products of club work were almost exactly one half the total value, or \$55,942.90. Highest profits were produced by the calf clubs which netted the youngsters concerned \$15,983.21. Pig club work was second in point of net profits. Garden, poultry, potato, corn, cooking, sewing, rabbit, sheep, home-making and canning come next, the milk goat being "the goat," with a profit of \$196.66.

**Station Uses Three Silos**  
Three silos are used in the experimental feeding tests at the Eastern Oregon branch experiment station, Union. One is filled with corn ensilage, another with peas and barley, and the third with sunflowers. Besides all this material the station produced 250 tons of alfalfa hay and several thousand bushels of grain in 1920.
