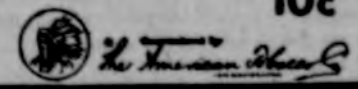


One of the camels belonging to John C. Wanner of Newark, N. J., heard that a certain place in that town was still dispensing something "damp," so he went to investigate.
