STATE NEWS IN BRIEF.

Baker.—Advertising for bids for im-
 provements to be made at the tourist
 camp grounds will be started soon.
 Mayor Gardner is getting specifica-
 tions ready for bidders.

Eugene.—A conference was held
 here recently between federal, state
 and local forest officials regarding pro-
 tection of the forests in the southern
 part of Lane county and the northern
 part of Douglas county.

Albany.—Tuesday, October 4, to and
 inclusive of Friday, October 7, were
 fixed definitely as the dates for the
 Linn county fair this fall at a meet-
 ing of the board of directors of the
 Linn County Fair association held here
 recently.

Tornado Fells Resort.
 Houston, Tex.—A tornado which
 was reported to have swept up from
 the coast and move eastward struck La
 Porte, near here Monday night, seri-
 ously injuring two persons, wiped out
 a summer resort near La Porte and
 caused property damage of thousands
 of dollars. All wires were down.

Boring a Hole in Glass.

Albany.—An eagle's nest containing
 two young birds was found on the
 limb of a large fir tree felled by wood-
 cutters on the farm of William Evans,
 five miles north of Lebanon. One of
 the birds was killed when the tree
 fell but the other was captured.

Bend.—Petitions filed recently re-
 sulted Thursday morning in designa-
 tion by the Deschutes county court of
 June 7 as the date on which a \$60,000
 bond issue will be voted on. If ap-
 proved, the bonds will finance cooper-
 ative work with the state highway
 commission.

Bend.—Snow has been receding rapidly
 in the Deschutes national forest,
 forest officials report, and scenic roads
 into the mountains will soon be open
 for use. It will be possible to reach
 Odell lake, one of the largest bodies of
 water in central Oregon, in two weeks,
 it was predicted.

Pendleton.—The first big sale of
 wool by Umatilla county growers this
 season became known last week, when
 it was announced that Alfred Smith,
 Tuesday disposed of a clip comprising
 about 50,000 pounds for the J. E. Live-
 stock company, to the Studley &
 Emery company of Boston.

ASTORIA.—A naval officer is to arrive
 here in the near future to take formal
 possession of the Tongue Point naval
 base site, which will be the first step
 of the department, leading up to be-
 ginning actual work in the improve-
 ment of the property and the estab-
 lishment of the naval base.

Salem.—Road work, already con-
 tracted since January 1, 1921, and pro-
 posed through awards to be made at
 a meeting of the state highway com-
 mission in Portland May 27, exceeds
 that for the entire year of 1920 by
 20 miles, according to a report pre-
 pared by Herbert Nunn, state highway
 engineer.

Dallas.—The Polk county highway
 controversy was definitely settled at
 a meeting here Friday between state
 highway commissioner Booth and Yeon
 and the members of the county court.
 By the terms of agreement, the com-
 mission will resume work at once on
 the Salem-Dallas highway, including a
 mile within the city limits of Dallas.

Salem.—The California-Oregon Pow-
 er company has filed with the state
 engineer application to appropriate
 2100 second feet of water from the Klamath
 river, for the development of
 70,000 horsepower. The site of this
 water appropriation was investigated
 by the state several years ago in con-
 junction with the United States reclama-
 tion service.

North Bend.—A. H. Derbyshire, sec-
 retary-treasurer of the Coos Bay farm
 loan association, had but \$22,000 allot-
 ted here for farm loans in 1921. Rules
 and regulation of getting loans were
 given in Mr. Derbyshire's announce-
 ment, and it was stated that the rate
 of interest had been increased from
 5 1/2 to 6 per cent. Since the loan plan
 went into effect, the Coos bay associa-
 tion usually has used its limit yearly.

Salem.—There were six fatalities
 due to industrial accidents in Oregon
 in the week ended May 12, according
 to a report issued by the state indus-
 trial accident commission Friday. The
 victims were: John Johnson, faller, In-
 dependence; John Anderson, wood-
 splitter, Portland; Lester Goodwin,
 laborer, Buena Vista; Ray Thompson,
 raftman, Nehalem; Frederick Weger,
 longshoreman, Astoria, and
 Walter Saka, logger, Black Rock.

Salem.—A big crop of loganberries
 and strawberries is promised here
 this year, according to S. H. Van
 Trump, county horticultural inspector,
 who recently completed a survey of
 the berry sections of the county. Peach
 trees, he said, had not yet recovered
 from the freeze in 1919, but the crop
 will be much larger than that of last
 year. The Italian prune crop was
 somewhat affected by recent rains and
 Mr. Van Trump said it was too early to
 estimate the damage.

GRIT SUPPLY IS ESSENTIAL
**Material Takes Place of Teeth in Pre-
 paring Fowl's Food for Fur-
 ther Digestion.**

Grit is essential to the health of
 fowls and to economy in feeding. Grit
 takes the place of teeth in preparing
 the feed for further digestion and is
 required for the proper preparation
 of feed in the gizzard. When the feed
 is not properly taken care of in this
 organ, an undue strain is thrown on
 the fowl's system, often resulting in
 disease and also allowing much of the
 nutriment to pass through the bird's
 body without being absorbed. In
 every pen or yard a box of grit should
 be kept. Recent investigators have
 asserted that grit is a part of the
 necessary feed of a flock, giving the
 fowls strong bones and a bright plum-
 age.

Ordinarily, the hen does not con-
 sume enough lime to form the shells
 of eggs, if she is laying abundantly,
 unless something besides the ordinary
 grain feeds is accessible to her. Oyster
 shells are very good for this purpose.
 A box of crushed shells may be
 placed before the fowls, allowing them
 to eat at will. Old mortar and fine
 gravel are also useful in supplying
 lime, say poultry specialists of the
 United States Department of Agricul-
 ture.

GEESE UNLIKE OTHER FOWLS
**Best Results Obtained by Mating in
 Pairs During Breeding Season—
 Partial to Mates.**

For best results geese should be
 mated in pairs during the breeding
 season. At least not more than two
 geese should be allowed for one gan-
 der. Geese are unlike any other farm
 poultry and are partial to their mates.
 A gander ought not to be kept more
 than three or four years, as an old
 gander is not a good breeder. From
 the other hand, females are more pro-
 lific when they get older, and as a rule
 the eggs are more fertile. Females
 may be kept for eight or ten years or
 even longer.

Feeding Baby Chicks.
