In his first letter he calls our attention to the good grade of seed potatoes to be had from Weston mountain and that some growers are now contracting this certified seed at \$40.00 per ton but most of them are inclined to hold back for higher figures. N. Seaman took the matter up immediately with Mr. Bennion and finds that this seed consists mostly of netted gems and Burbanks. Mr. Bennion's answer in full reads as follows:

"If you are after Early Ohio or Earliest of All you perhaps can do no better than take advantage of the offer made by a Moscow firm. Weston Mountain will produce this year nothing but certified Netted Gems and Burbanks. Some growers, however, are planning on growing some certified stock another year."

From this you will understand, the variety desirable for this district is hard to get but if anyone can or wishes to try out Netted Gems and Burbanks, they should take their case up with Mr. Bennion at Pendleton.
