STATE NEWS IN BRIEF.

Prineville.—Cattle men are shipping out many cattle at this time. During the past week 41 carloads have been shipped to Portland over the City of Prineville railroad.

Albany.—An old-fashioned horse-shoe pitching tournament will be a feature of the Linn county fair next week. It will take place during the forenoon of October 5.

Salem.—There were three fatalities due to industrial accident in Oregon during the week ending September 22, according to a report prepared here by the state industrial accident commission.

Astoria.—The fall fishing season on the Columbia river opened at noon Saturday, but the pack will be exceedingly small. Only two of the packing plants on the river are to operate, as far as announced.

Prineville.—Dr. H. W. Lytle, state veterinarian, has sent health certificates to 62 dairymen in Crook county for their herds. Dr. Lytle recently made a test throughout the county and found no tubercular reactions in any of the herds examined.

Portland.—New business in the lumber industry of western Oregon and western Washington was in excess of production for the week ended September 17 by more than 5,000,000 feet, according to the weekly lumber review just issued by the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

Salem.—Automobile license fees aggregating \$449,800.89 were apportioned among the various counties of the state Saturday by order of Sam A. Koser, secretary of state. This is the second distribution of these fees for the year, and was made under an act of the 1921 legislature.

Harrisburg.—The hop industry of the Harrisburg section will bring to the growers about \$130,000 for this year's crop. This estimate is made from figures compiled by the Harrisburg Bulletin. The total acreage is about 375 and the total number of bales of hops is approximately 2150.

Brownsville.—The Calapalooa valley fair was held here Friday under ideal weather conditions and a good crowd attended. A programme, featuring speeches by J. K. Weatherford of Albany, Mayor White and others, occurred in the evening by way of celebration over completion of Brownsville paving.

Grants Pass.—Mystery surrounds the death of J. N. Rainey, 60 years, recluse, whose body was found Saturday in his cabin on Whiskey creek, near here. Little is known of the old man here, other than that he made an occasional visit to town in order to sell fish. He was an old-time fisherman and trapper.

Salem.—School notes aggregating \$6,771,169.83 were in custody of George G. Brown, clerk of the Oregon state land board, on September 1, 1921, according to a report issued Saturday. Of these securities, \$172,030 represented agricultural college notes, \$80,725 University of Oregon notes and \$444,587.96 rural credit loan notes.

Boardman.—An extensive rabbit campaign was worked out Saturday night, Albert Swain of the United States biological survey co-operating with the local committee. Poisoning in several ways is to be employed by everybody. Several wire fence traps are to be built and a series of drives covering the project will be staged.

The Dalles.—Wasco county's 1921 apple crop probably will exceed 275,000 packed boxes, in the opinion of County Agent Jackman. Of this total about 165,000 boxes of the fruit will come from the Mosier district, the remainder coming from Dufur, Jackman estimates. Nearly all of this year's apple crop is up to a high standard. Most of the apples are large and well colored.

Cottage Grove.—The most important piece of work so far undertaken by the reorganized chamber of commerce is a city beautification and sanitation campaign. A picture-taking contest is in progress. Prizes will be given for the best pictures of most unsightly and unsanitary spots in Cottage Grove. A number of pictures already have been submitted and more are being taken.

Marshfield.—The legion of the Black Cross is a new institution forming here, according to colored posters distributed about the district. The order is in the interests of repealing the prohibition law and replacing it with a better one. It stands for moderation, not fanaticism; believes in the right of a person to eat or drink whatever he chooses, so long as he does not become a public nuisance or encroach upon the rights of others. The personal representatives of the legion will call upon the people for memberships. Nobody knows who is organizing the legion.

SEASONABLE FOODS.

There must be something wrong with the people who do not enjoy the luscious muskmelon and the rosy-meat watermelon, yet you find men who even dislike lemon pie, so it is hard to suit all tastes; however, "there is no loss without some gain," for there wouldn't be enough of such good things to satisfy all appetites if everybody wanted the same food at the same time.

Orange Ice in Melon Cups.
This is really the nth power of serving, for each alone is delicious enough. Wash the small melons, cut in halves and scrape out the seeds and membrane carefully. Chill and fill with orange ice. Boil one cupful of sugar with a pint of water and the grated rind of an orange, add the juice of one lemon and the juice of four oranges, strain and freeze as usual.

Pimento Cheese.
A most delicious cheese may be prepared at home at a small fraction of the cost usually paid for such an article. Take one-fourth of a pound of good, snappy American cheese, put through the meat chopper, add gruid with three hard-cooked eggs, three or four canned pimentos. Alternate the egg and peppers through the grinder to save the juice of the pepper, season with salt and cayenne, add mayonnaise dressing to moisten, and put away to chill. Cover with paraffin paper and keep in the ice chest. It never spoils, for it doesn't last long enough. This is excellent for the sandwich filling for hungry boys and men who carry lunches to school or work.

Fried Chicken With Boiled Rice.
Cut up the chicken for frying, add butter to the hot frying pan, sprinkle the seasoning in flour and roll each piece until well covered. Place in the pan and cook slowly, closely covered, until quite tender, then brown. The chicken will be much more delicious and moist than if fried brown at once. Heap a mound of well-cooked hot rice in the center of the platter, surround with the chicken and serve with ripe olives.

Twin Mountain Muffins.
Cream one-third of a cupful of butter, add one-fourth of a cupful of sugar, then alternately add two cupfuls of a cupful of milk, two cupfuls of sifted flour, sifted with four teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt; add one egg well beaten, mix and bake in gem pans. A cupful of well-floured blueberries, or dates finely cut, may be added if desired.

How to Succeed—How to Get Ahead—How to Make Good

NEVER A BETTER TIME

There never was a better time than today for the girl or woman who wants to do well in business to make a success. The world needs constructive work. It doesn't care who does it, provided the work is good. Women are picked for jobs that not long ago would certainly have gone to men. In Washington, for instance, a girl has been made manager of the lunch room in the Treasury building. This restaurant serves lunches to 1,000 government employees every day. The business detail of running such a place is great, and only a trained woman could undertake it. But Miss Dorothy Chapman is trained, having been graduated in home economics at Cornell university, one of a large class. And these trained women will find the field ready for them.

There are other ways for women who have taken special training in domestic science to make money. One such woman serves box lunches to office workers in one of the big city office buildings. These lunches are put up at different prices, three grades, each containing a balanced ration, excellent food, well-prepared and daintily served in its white box.

There is certainly an opportunity to use this idea at railway stations. The thing is to be the first in the field at the chosen center.
Honest value and sound methods are what are needed—and training! Training is by no means a college career or work in a business school, though these are fine things to have. Training can be self-acquired if you really want it.
