### MANY STANDS OF BEES ARE WITHOUT FEED FOR WINTER

#### O. A. C. Experiment Station Tells How Bees Should be Fed; Syrup is Recommended

Due to the light honey crop this season many stands of bees have been left with depleted stores for winter feeding, according to observations by the O. A. C. experiment station. A check should be made of all hives and feeding resorted to, where necessary to avoid loss. A syrup, two

parts sugar and one part water with a teaspoonful of tartaric acid to every 20 pounds of sugar, makes a good feed. To make a feeder take a friction top bucket, punch from 30 to 60 small holes in the lid, and invert this filled with syrup on top of the hive after removing the hive cover. An extra box may then be set over the bucket and the cover replaced. Paper placed between the hive and upper box, with a hole cut the size of the feed bucket will retain the heat of the hive.

There are two sides to profiteering in food, remarks the Philadelphia Record, but the side that the consumer gets is the rough side.—Charleston News and Courier.
