**LIFE OF WHITMAN
 TOLD BY PENROSE**

BAPTIST CHURCH IS CROWDED FOR ADDRESS

Work of Missionary Empire Builder Told by College Head; Massacre is Described

Standing room only was the order of things at the Baptist church Friday evening when Dr. Stephen Penrose told the large audience which had gathered to hear him, of the graphic story of Marcus Whitman in the northwest.

Dr. Penrose as president of the institution which is the memorial of Whitman's work; has had access to much of the data on Whitman's life which has not been published in the regular histories and gave his audience a splendid picture of the missionary who did so much to add the Inland Empire to the domains of the United States.

Whitman Comes West
 Whitman's western experiences began in 1832 when he started across the plains with his bride and three other persons to found Christian missions in the north-west. His was the honor of bringing the first wagon over the great divide. The mission was finally founded a few miles from the present city of Walla Walla.

Here they lived and worked until 1843 when the rumor reached him that the United States was about to give the Oregon country to Great Britain. This rumor was false but Whitman believing it set off with one companion for the east. It was late in the fall and the journey over 2000 miles of wilderness was made in the middle of winter.

They were forced to detour several hundred miles out of their course and finally reached the Mississippi in the present state of Arkansas. Here his companion stopped but Whitman went on and reached Washington in March. Daniel Webster gave him a cool reception but President Tyler promised him that no treaty would be made on the Oregon question until Whitman had had a year to prove that a wagon train could be taken across the plains to Oregon.

Wagon Train Crosses
 This Whitman did in 1844 and proved that Oregon could be settled from the states. Then in 1846 President Polk who was elected on the slogan, "54-40 or Fight," made a treaty which gave the United States the territory she now has.

Ladies Quartet Sings
 Dr. Penrose was followed by the ladies quartet which sang, "Old Kentucky home." The quartet includes Mrs. W. A. Correll, Mrs. B. S. Kingsley, Mrs. J. K. Shotwell and Mrs. M. R. Baker. Mrs. C. W. Kellogg made a splendid introductory speech at the opening of the program. Mrs. Kellogg is president of the Commu-

ity club under whose auspices Dr. Penrose came to Hermiston.
