STATE NEWS IN BRIEF.

Salem.—Marion county's contributions to the Red Cross now total \$3600, according to a report issued here Saturday. Approximately \$2100 of this amount was raised outside of the city of Salem.

Eugene.—Saturday was a good day in Eugene for marriage licenses to aged couples. County Clerk Bryson issued a license to William Lane, 80, and Mrs. Emily J. Lammon, 63, both of Cottage Grove.

Hood River.—With the line of the Mount Hood Railroad company open and apples moving from valley warehouses, shipments of carlots of fruit from here have increased the last week, reaching 242.

Salem.—F. L. Walker, Salem merchant, was arrested here Friday charged with selling cigarettes to minors. When arraigned in the justice court Walker took his day to plead. He will appear in the justice court for arraignment tomorrow.

Salem.—Immediate burning of a number of slashings in Clatsop county will be recommended by P. S. King of the state forestry offices, and T. T. Munger of the district forester's office with headquarters in Portland, according to a report prepared here by F. A. Elliott, state forester.

Cottage Grove.—It is feared that the cold snap of the past few days has seriously interfered with the winter fruit crop. Strawberry plants have been well loaded with berries. Currant bushes have been budding and fruit generally has been exhibiting intentions of producing a crop.

Reedsport.—Miss Caroline Wallace, public health nurse for Douglas county, has just completed a health survey of this city and finds it to rank very high with coast towns. More of the 150 children in the public schools are over-weight than under, while very little illness has been reported.

Salem.—The Shell Oil company of California has remitted to the secretary of state \$4105.19, covering the tax on the corporation's sales of gasoline and distillate in Oregon during the month of November. Of this amount \$2952 was paid under the 1919 law and \$2053.15 under the 1920 act.

Corvallis.—D. C. Tenney, vice-president of the American Gas Construction company, was in Corvallis recently from Newton, Iowa, to investigate the possibilities of starting a gas plant in this city. He will also visit Albany to look over that field, with the idea of serving both cities, should a plant be erected.

Salem.—There were three fatal accidents in Oregon industries during the week ending December 15, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victims were A. Engstrom, laborer, Milwaukie; W. P. Wilson, laborer, Oregon City, and C. C. Ward, bucker, North Bend.

Eugene.—Quite an industry in the gathering of moss and shipping it to San Francisco has sprung up in the western part of Lane county in the Coast mountains, according to J. G. Swan, rural county club leader and school supervisor, who has just returned from a week's trip to that portion of the county.

Salem.—Fines imposed on traffic violators in the various counties of the state for November, as reported to the secretary of state, aggregated \$5054.80, according to a statement issued Friday by the state motor vehicle department. The statement was prepared by T. A. Rafferty, in charge of the state traffic officers.

Salem.—"Why Gamble With Death?" is the title of a large placard recently issued by the Southern Pacific Railroad company for distribution among automobile garages in the state. The placard calls attention to the dangers confronting motorists, and urges their co-operation in preventing accidents at railroad crossings.

Prineville.—At a meeting of the land owners of the Camp and Bear creek neighborhoods, called at the home of Alax Ammons, near Barnes, for the purpose of perfecting plans for the eradication of jack rabbits and sage rats in that neighborhood, County Agent Tucker met with the men and outlined the methods of destroying the pests. An order for \$95 worth of strychnine was sent.

Salem.—Practically all of the 1921 crop of prunes has been sold at prices satisfactory to growers, according to R. C. Paulus, manager of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association. Prunes in the hands of the independent growers are practically negligible, while the bins of the association and packers have been cleared. Mr. Paulus predicted that no difficulty will be encountered by dealers in disposing of the 1922 crop.

SOLVE SHANTUNG QUESTION

Japan and China Are Reaching Agreement Over Railway Line.

Washington, D. C.—As the Japanese-Chinese negotiations over Shantung approach a decision the arms delegates are turning their attention to other features of the far eastern situation. The committee meetings were postponed to give the Shantung problem a clear field.

It appeared Monday night that the central question of the Shantung discussion, withdrawal of Japanese control from the Tsingtao-Tsinanfu railway, was near a solution and that the Japanese and Chinese might be brought into complete accord shortly.

Among other far eastern questions the Chinese request for abrogation of the 21 demands and the proposal for withdrawals of powers from occupied territory in China are attracting interesting notice. The Chinese delegates who are maintaining that they still represent the Chinese people, even though the Peking cabinet has been overthrown, issued a statement here declaring that the 21-demand agreements must be abrogated if the decisions of the conference are to amount to "more than scraps of paper."

At the same time the Japanese attracted added attention to the question of occupied territory by revealing their desire to keep their troops in northern Saghallen as well as in the Port Arthur district.

Overthrow of the Peking cabinet has gained wide attention in conference circles, but it apparently has not changed the far eastern negotiations. The Japanese will not comment on it except to say that it was apparently due to internal troubles. Ma Zoo, Washington representative of the rival government at Canton, said in a statement that the Peking delegation knows it does not represent the people of China and that the fall of the Peking cabinet long had been expected.

Many Plagues Forecast. London.—The year 1926 is destined to shake the world to its foundation, both physically and politically. It is to be a succession of plagues, famine, floods, shipwrecks, rioting and revolution. So says the British Journal of Astrology, which has drawn the horoscope for that year, when the planets Mars and Mercury will be in conjunction.

Six years later the great Armageddon is to take place. It will be a final conflict between Mohammedanism, allied with bolshevism, against the united Anglo-Saxon world. It will end in a "universal peace" in 1932, but "there will be so few of us left and we shall all be so tired that peace should happen anyhow," the horoscope says.

Revolt Stirrs Portugal. London.—A revolution has broken out in Portugal, according to a dispatch to the Daily Chronicle from Paris. It began with cannonading along the Tagus river and severe casualties have resulted to both sides in the controversy. The hospitals are crowded. The dispatch adds that Cunha Leal, who formed a temporary ministry last week, was attacked in the Carlos barracks and he and his followers were compelled to retreat.

Sugar Prices Discussed. Washington, D. C.—Efforts to stabilize the price of sugar in the United States and arrange for disposal of the existing surplus without any appreciable increase in price were continued Monday at a meeting of representatives of the industry and Secretary Hoover. The former included spokesmen for the cane sugar growers of Louisiana, the beet sugar producers of the Pacific coast and Cuban interests.

Livestock Loans Made. Washington, D. C.—Approval of 150 advances for agricultural and livestock purposes, aggregating \$4,234,000, was announced Monday by the war finance corporation. States participating in the loans included Colorado, \$62,000; Idaho, \$77,000; Montana, \$128,000; Oregon, \$75,000; Utah, \$220,000; Washington, \$70,000, and Wyoming, \$225,000.

Seven Burned to Death. Windsor, Nova Scotia.—Mrs. Reuben Johnson and her six children, aged from 3 to 15, were burned to death Sunday in a fire which destroyed their home. Mr. Johnson had been called away from home a short time before to help fight a fire at a neighbor's house. He returned to find his own home ablaze.

Denmark Gets \$30,000,000 Loan. New York.—A \$30,000,000 loan to the kingdom of Denmark has been made by the National City company, which is affiliated with the National City bank. The loan will bear interest at 6 per cent, will run for 20 years and will be callable at 105.
