**Prizes For Picked People**

The Hermiston Herald has been requested to announce that all high school students in this territory are eligible for the prize play writing contest, conducted by the Dramatic Club of Gooding College, which is composed of members chosen from the department of expression.

This contest has grown out of the conviction that there is much latent talent in our high schools which, if discovered and developed, will lead to the betterment of the American drama.

Boardman, Ore., Jan. 23—The work of the first semester of the Boardman school was completed last week practically all the examinations and reports having been completed in spite of adverse conditions resulting in the school pumping plant going out of commission. The high school play has been chosen and the books ordered. It will be a musical comedy entitled "In Hot Tamale Land."

Boardman, Ore., Jan. 16—Notices have been served on the people of the town that after 30 days water service from the school plant will be discontinued, as the rentals, even if all paid in, would not pay for the wear and tear on the machinery. Further action of the school board at its regular meeting last Saturday included the placing of an order for a carload of coal with Ira A. Berger, who had in the lowest bid when the decision was made. Later in the day another similar bid was placed. Past and future expenditures were checked up with the idea of arranging such economies as possible without decreasing the efficiency of the schools. A new call for outstanding warrants is being made by the school clerk covering the last installment of tax received from the county treasurer. The West side bus route has been changed to go directly south from the school house as long as the roads are in suitable condition.
