NEWPORT GETS CONTRACT

The Newport Construction company has been awarded the contract for grading and graveling the Echo-Butter Creek road. The distance is 6.97 miles. The work will begin at once and is to be completed by August 31. The bid was \$34,115.70. J. K. Shotwell submitted a bid of \$35,482.80.

Newport will also build four miles of new road along stage gulch east of Echo. This contract calls for grading and graveling. The amount is about \$16,000. Work has already commenced on this job.
