FARMERS HARVEST FIRST ALFALFA CROP AT BOARDMAN

Mr. Hunt Receives Orders for Hay at \$14 F. O. B. Cars; New Minister at Boardman

Boardman, Oregon, June 12—A beginning has been made in the harvesting of the first crop of alfalfa in this section, several fields having been "knocked down." The crop is ready rather earlier than expected owing to the late spring but the hot weather of the past two weeks has brought it forward rapidly. Prospects are good for four crops.

Manager L. A. Hunt of the Hay Growers association reports from the Hermiston office that the first orders for new hay are in at \$14 f. o. b. cars. While this is not extraordinary, it is better than last year. Feeders are trying to contract in the stack at \$8 or \$9 but are finding few takers.

The Rev. E. Benson of Portland has assumed charge of the churches of Boardman and Umatilla. Mr. Benson is a very able minister. He is on the retired list and is helping out until such time as a pastor can be secured which may be six months or a year. Children's day exercises will be held next Sunday.

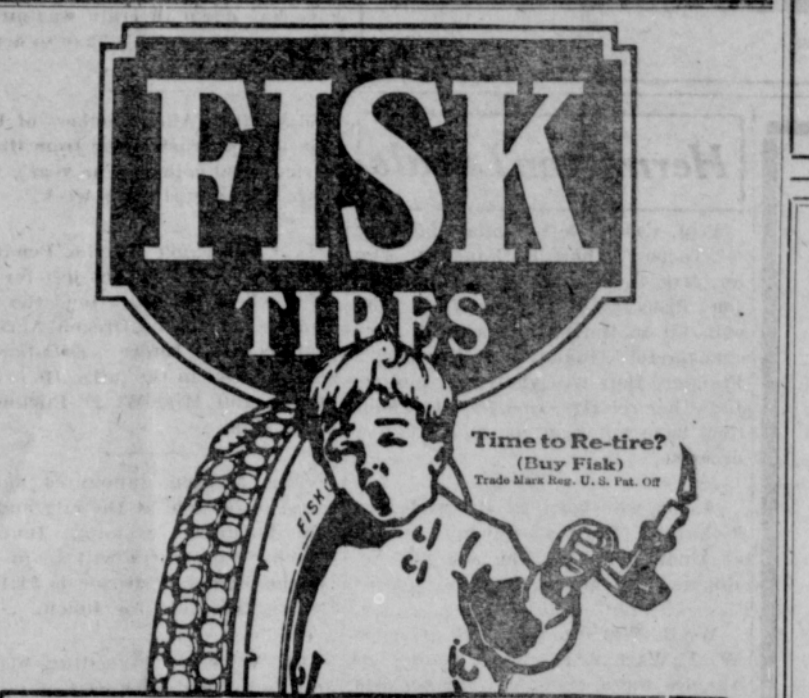
