Play House Secures Famous Picture Drama; Show is 12 Reels; 25 Main Characters

Probably the strongest and most distinguished cast ever assembled for any picture in the history of the screen in the Rex Ingram production for Metro of "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse," adapted by June Mathis from the world-famous novel by Vicente Blasco Ibanez, showing at the Play House Sunday evening.
