FUNERAL OF MRS. SHELEDAY

Mrs. Iona Della, beloved wife of Samuel R. Shelleday, (formerly Miss Iona Vose of Sturgis,) of Hermiston, Oregon, died at a hospital in Pendleton, Oregon, on Friday, June 23. The remains were shipped to Sturgis for burial and arrived last Thursday evening and were taken to the home of the deceased's mother, Mrs. Charlotte Vose. The body was accompanied here by her husband.

The funeral services were conducted Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock in St. Thomas' Episcopal church by the Rev. Wheeler of Rapid City. The church was beautifully decorated with flowers and the services were largely attended by sorrowing friends of the deceased, who had lived in Sturgis nearly all her life. The floral emblems were many and of the most beautiful.

Interment of the remains was made in Bear Butte cemetery. The pallbearers were Edward Garlick, H. D. Berger, Jas. H. Golden, Jos. Schnell, John Kelly and P. S. Welch. Deceased was only 36 years, 3 months and 8 days of age, and leaves to mourn her sudden demise, her husband and stepson, mother and two brothers. She was well and most favorably known to nearly everybody in this vicinity and the news of her

death was a shock to all. To those left behind to mourn her death, the most heartfelt sympathy is extended.—Sturgis Record.

Boilermakers	71 cents per hour
Blacksmiths	70 cents per hour
Electricians	70 cents per hour
Sheet metal and other workers in this line	70 cents per hour
Freight car repairers	63 cents per hour
Car inspectors	63 cents per hour
Painters, freight cars	63 cents per hour
Helpers, all crafts	47 cents per hour

These men are wanted to take the place of men who are striking against the decision of the United States Railroad Labor Board, and their status, and the FULL PROTECTION GUARANTEED, are explained by Mr. Ben W. Hooper, Chairman, in his statement of July 1:

"In this case the conflict is not between the employer and the oppressed employee. The people of this country, through an act of congress, signed by President Wilson, established a tribunal to decide such disputes over wages and working conditions, which are submitted to it in a proper manner. It is the decision of this tribunal against which the shop craft are striking.

"Regardless of any question of the right of the men to strike, the men who take the strikers' places are merely accepting the wages and working conditions prescribed by a government tribunal and are performing a public service. They are not accepting the wages and working conditions which an employer is trying to impose. FOR THIS REASON PUBLIC SENTIMENT AND FULL GOVERNMENT POWER WILL PROTECT THE MEN WHO REMAIN IN THEIR POSITIONS AND THE NEW MEN WHO MAY COME IN."
