THOSE WHO STOP AT HERMISTON AUTO CAMP

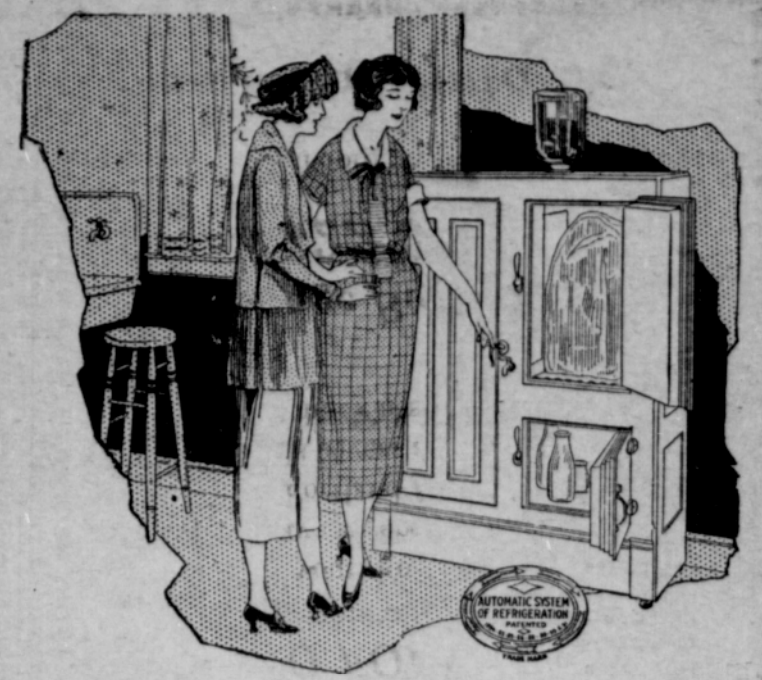
