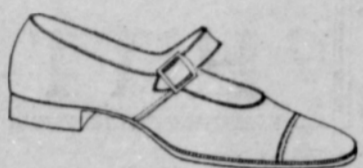

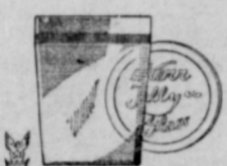

Anyone wishing any old magazines call at the library, sometime this week.

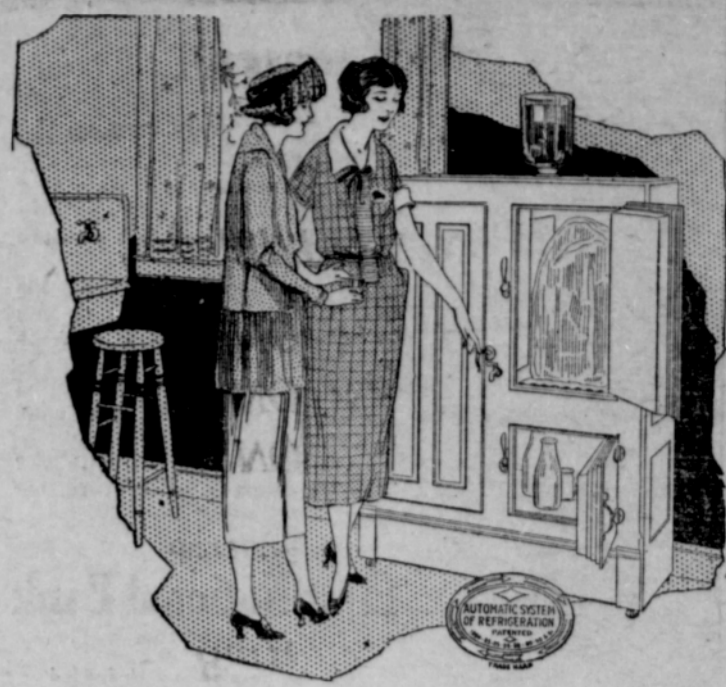
George Currey is spending the week with Oscar Mikesell, who lives near the reservoir.
