"BEWARE THE GREEN GRASSES"

On the Umatilla project I have seen a man raising hogs. He has been engaged in the business a number of years and is very successful. You can see them on the alfalfa fields, in the pens and sheds—hogs, dozens of them, hundreds of them. When the time for marketing comes it seems that all the teams in the neighborhood are engaged in hauling hogs to the cars. A caravan of hogs moves through the streets all day. They are prize porkers, they set the ribbons and the money, they command the highest prices. Various explanations have been given. Some say that it is all luck; some that it is because of outside influences—the wind and the tide, the influence of Mars, the sun and the moon, we infer. Some say this and some that, but a few attribute the success to the land and the water coupled with industry and intelligence.

Another has taken the big prizes at the state fair and elsewhere. Ribbons and prizes galore for the best hogs in the state, all raised at Hermiston. Luck again they say; a chance breeding, something which may happen once or twice in a century; but some say that it is due to some thought and a knowledge of hogs.

Atmospheric Phenomenon.

Five distinct bands of a light salmon pink color, separated by five corresponding bands of pale blue, were visible, stretching up into the heavens from the sinking sun. The phenomenon lasted about an hour, and later on the same evening a violent thunderstorm broke over the place where the spectacle had been witnessed. 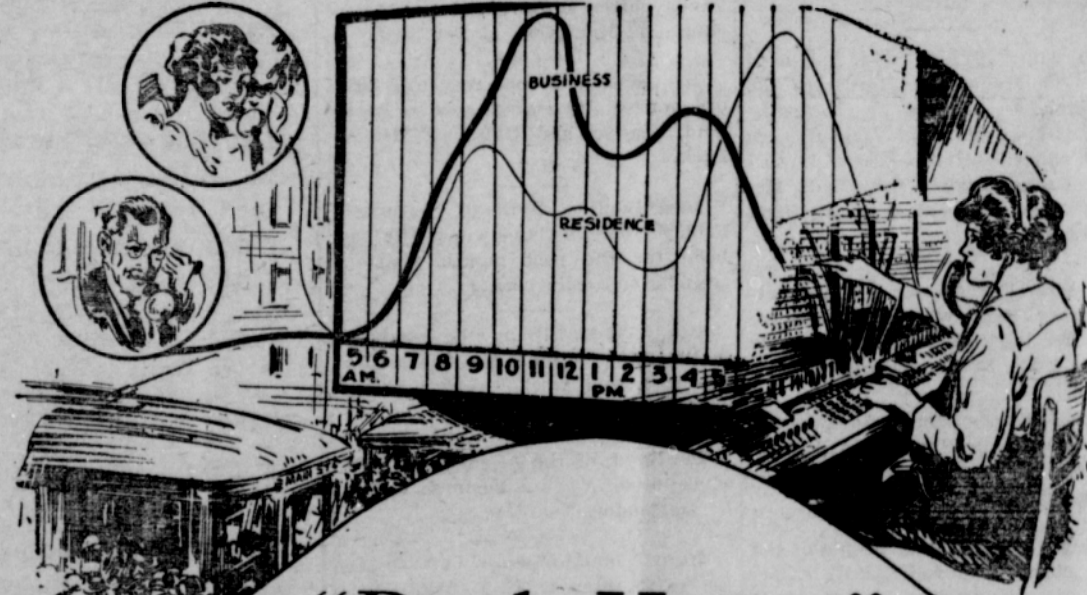
