**Alfalfa Seed Yields a Big Crop**  
C. F. Ames and son threshed the two and one-half acre first crop alfalfa seed for R. C. Canfield early this week. The yield was 1070 pounds—428 pounds per acre. Alfalfa seed is selling for 23 and 24 cents, making a return of over \$38 per acre.  
The seed was cut and stacked early in August, water applied and at this time a fair fourth crop of hay is on the ground. The cost of threshing was \$1.10 per acre.
