FREE TO USE BONUS MONEY AS DESIRED

Supreme Court Holds That Ex-Servicemen Can Spend Loan as They Want

Money secured by ex-service men through a loan from the state bonus fund may be used in any manner the borrower may choose to use it, according to an opinion written by Justice Rand and handed down by the supreme court in which it is pointed out that the constitutional amendment creating the state bonus fund does not authorize the state bonus commission to limit the use of bonus loans to the purchase of a farm or home.

The opinion is based upon the appeal of Frank W. Moore from the judgement of Judge Percy R. Kelly of the Marion county circuit court in a case involving the right of the commission to reject an application for a loan upon the ground that the applicant will use the money borrowed for purposes other than to acquire a farm or a home. The lower court had upheld the commission in its ruling rejecting Moore's application.

CIGARET SMOKING INJURIOUS TO WOMEN

The enormous increase in cigaret smoking among women, says the London Times, calls for some protest by the medical profession. He declares the habit in many instances is passing beyond a pleasure and becoming a vice.

"The absorption of nicotine, which is the danger element in the matter," the paper proceeds, "produces a condition of nervous distress which is frequently painful to observe. From this proceed palpitations and exhaustion and outbursts of emotion. Woman's delicate nervous organism was certainly not intended to endure large doses of this poison. Her functions as a mother cannot but be interfered with when she indulges in it to excess."

It is the habit of many English women and girls to smoke cigarets in public, and not a few may be seen in restaurants and hotels smoking long slender pipes. Women's organizations and social improvement societies have begun a crusade against this "inelegant and unwomanly practice."

the beginning and have retained it on the original schedule despite the cancellation of several dates elsewhere.

"It is difficult, almost impossible to describe our show in a manner to indicate the real bigness of it all, but we do feel that we have brought into this country a show that is utterly different from any other industrial exposition, either traveling or stationary, every seen in the Northwest.

Valued at \$100,000

"One hundred thousand dollars is no small sum, but that is out bona fide, legitimate investment in the property of the caravan. In fact, \$100,000 is under rather than over the mark.
