

PIERCE WINS BY 30,000 MAJORITY

SCHOOL BILL CARRIES BY MORE THAN 13,000

Ritner and Taylor Successful; De Hart May Defeat Cranston For Treasurer

With a majority of nearly 30,000 votes, Walter M. Pierce, democrat, Tuesday was elected governor of Oregon over Ben W. Olcott, republican. All but nine counties of the state were carried by Pierce.

Returns this morning indicated that the school bill would carry by more than 13,000. Multnomah county and Portland went strongest in favor of the bill.

N. J. Sinnott has a good lead over James Harvey Graham for congressman in the second district. O. P. Hoff defeated Touville for state treasurer with a lead of more than 42,000.

Churchill for state superintendent and Gram for labor commissioner were both victorious. Campbell received more than 58,000 over his nearest competitor for public service commissioner.

Watkins has a slight lead over McArthur for congress with a few precincts still to be heard from. Henry Taylor for joint senator and Roy W. Ritner are practically sure of election. Ritner has a lead of nearly 1,000 votes over Reineman while Taylor has a smaller lead over Eberhard. Smith has apparently defeated Lieullen for joint representative and present returns would indicate that De Hart would win over Cranston for county treasurer. Miller has a lead for representative and is fairly sure of election.

The school bill lost in this county by more than 200 but Pierce carried the county easily for the governor. The single tax was voted down by a big majority but the proposition tax is still in doubt. The income tax was defeated.

Pierce Beats Olcott Here
Pierce ran away from Olcott in the three Hermiston precincts and the compulsory school bill finished away in the lead. In precinct 55, Columbia district, Pierce got 85 votes of the 107 ballots cast. On the east side of town, precinct 54, the vote was double that of Olcott and the same was true in precinct 53 on the west side.

CRUCIAL GAME AT ATHENA SATURDAY

HERMISTON IN LINE FOR COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

Chance For Eastern Oregon Title; Shotwell Out of Play With Tonsillitis

The most important game of the season so far as the Hermiston high school football team are concerned will be played next Saturday when they line up against Athena on the Athena field. If Hermiston emerges winner they will be tied with McLoughlin high school of Milton for the county championship and runner up for the championship of Eastern Oregon.

Then to future predict. McLoughlin plays Pendleton the week before Thanksgiving in the Round-Up City. Should they lose and Hermiston win Saturday from Athena, Coach Arnold Gralapp's pigskin artists will have a clear title to Umatilla county championship and be tied with The Dalles for the Eastern Oregon honors. The Dalles defeated Pendleton last Friday 26 to 14.

Athena's defeat by McLoughlin last Tuesday has put them out of the running for honors but it does not alter the fact that they have one of the strongest teams in the Eastern part of the state and that Hermiston will have to extend themselves to win. Both teams will use their best lineups. Coach Gralapp depending a great deal on the reliable toe of Ernie Addelman and the line plunging of Johnny Haddock. The boys have had two weeks rest now and are reported to be in fair condition with one exception, "Shotsy" Shotwell. Shotwell is suffering from tonsillitis and it is very doubtful that he will be in the game. Handline will probably go in the backfield in the absence of "Shotsy."

A large delegation of town and country folks will go over from here to witness the contest and help in cheering the champs on to victory. It is expected that with the holiday, Armistice Day, a record crowd will be on hand.

Umatilla Home Demonstration Agent Succeeded By Miss Edith M. Hoffman

Van Deusen, for the past two years home demonstration agent in Umatilla County, is resigning her position to become a member of the extension department of the University of Missouri, as general home economics worker with special work in the clothing field. She will be succeeded by Miss Edith M. Hoffman, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, who arrived in Pendleton last Tuesday.

Mrs. Van Deusen during her stay here has made scores of friends and has carried on the home demonstration work in 29 Umatilla districts. Many expressions of regret at her departure are heard. She will visit her son, Ted, who is a student at Stanford, and will go from there to Columbia, Missouri.

Miss Hoffman, Mrs. Van Deusen's successor, is a Columbia University woman. After two and a half years of home demonstration work in North Dakota she resigned to spend a year of study in Paris. She has just recently returned from abroad.

REDUCE RED CROSS BUDGET THIS YEAR

SLASH \$2,735,975 FROM 1921 EXPENDITURES

Annual Roll Call Starts Saturday and Continues Until November 30

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Adhering to its post-war policy of condensation and coordination without affecting efficiency or accomplishment, the American Red Cross has adopted a budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923, showing a reduction of \$2,735,975 as compared with the expenditures of last year. The budget, \$9,739,872.47 for 1922-23, is apportioned solely for the activities of the national organization, and it is exclusive of the large financial operations of the 3,300 active Red Cross chapters which, it is estimated, added to the national budget would show a total not far under \$20,000,000.

Budget allotments for domestic operations aggregate \$6,335,795.39, which is \$488,015.32 less than expenditures for 1921-22. For foreign operations the total is \$3,404,077.08, less by \$2,247,959.90 than was spent the previous year.

The reduction in cost of domestic operations represents a saving in overhead expenses and decreased personnel through the combining of divisional units. The foreign operations, with the exception of the Junior American Red Cross, were practically terminated on last July 1 with the fulfillment of obligations and commitments abroad. Of this retirement, Chairman John Barton Payne in his annual report says: "One lesson learned from the war is that inflation is easier than retrenchment, and it required considerable time to withdraw from Europe without giving our friends there the impression that we were leaving them in the lurch. They had learned to expect much from American altruism; but all legitimate expectations."

Secore, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Pendleton, will be the principal speaker at the "Father and Son" banquet to be given Friday evening at 7:30 in the Methodist church parlors, it was announced by Rev. Harry A. Wann, pastor of the Methodist church, at the Commercial club meeting Tuesday noon at the Oregon Cafe. Musical numbers and other entertainment has been arranged for the occasion, it was said.

Coach Arnold Gralapp of the high school appeared before the club Tuesday and asked the members to co-operate with the team to extent of taking 13 of the players to Athena Saturday. The others had been provided for. E. J. Kingsley, Dr. F. V. Prime, Tom Fraser and several others declared their intention of going to the game and taking some of the players. It is believed that all will be cared for without any trouble.

THOUSANDS ATTEND PORTLAND EXPOSITION

Approximately 150,000 persons are expected to attend the Pacific International Livestock Exposition to be held at Portland, November 4 to 11, according to announcement made by John M. Scott, General Passenger Agent for the Southern Pacific company at Portland.

Livestock breeders from the entire Pacific Coast, including points as far north as British Columbia, have arranged for entries at the show and more than \$75,000 will be awarded in prizes.

Reduced railroad fares to the exposition have been granted by the Southern Pacific company from all points on its lines in Oregon, California, Nevada and Arizona.

Hermiston's one and only ticket in the field at the city election Tuesday made a clean sweep. With the exception of a few scattering votes the 227 ballots cast were for the new administration.

R. W. Brownson was the high man, getting 221 votes out of a possible 227. The new council that will take office in January and the number of votes each received follows:

Chief of Police C. H. Crandall was elected Constable by majority vote in the three local precincts.
