This is the play in which Mme. Olga Petrova starred so successfully on the American stage several years ago and which created a furore throughout Europe, being acclaimed one of the strongest dramas of the age. It was chosen for M'as Talmadge as the title role affords the beautiful and talented young player the greatest opportunity of her career for emotional acting.

The story is that of a young Russian pianist, who, suspected of Nihilism, escapes to England, where she falls in love with a struggling composer. They are married and settle in Paris, where Panthea's husband tries in vain to get a hearing for his opera. The many disappointments impair his health and the physicians declare that he will die unless his ambition to have his opera produced is realized. For the sake of her husband Panthea makes a compact with an elderly admirer who has great influence in musical circles. Her sacrifice brings about the triumphant production of her husband's opera, but at the moment of his great success he discovers the manner in which Panthea induced her friend, the Baron, to exert his influence.

This situation leads to one of the strongest dramatic climaxes ever seen on the screen and in the end Panthea and her husband are reconciled just as the long arm of the Russian secret police stretches out from Petrograd to seize its prey in Paris.

ions have now been honorably met.

"The American Red Cross will preserve the confidence of the American people by a conscientious and resolute effort to keep down overhead expense without loss of efficiency in those activities where the Red Cross has unquestioned obligations and responsibilities."

Four years after the end of the World War the one "unquestioned obligation" which the Red Cross is meeting with a spirit of liberality both in funds and service, is the work for disabled ex-service men and their dependents. Of the domestic budget \$3,030,692.90 is set apart by the national organization for soldier service—\$366,000 more than was expended in 1921-22. The increase is imperative in order to keep pace with the demands for on June 1 last 27,487 ex-service men were under treatment from the government, 1,187 more than recorded last year. This figure is exclusive of service to 11,087 enlisted men of the regular army and navy reported under treatment in government hospitals. Veteran aid is regarded as a Red Cross work which must supplement the program of mass rehabilitation under federal laws and regulations through individual ministrations and interest.

Other outstanding domestic items in the 1922-23 budget are: For disaster relief, \$750,000; for emergencies in chapter work \$500,000; for service and assistance to chapter and their branches, \$1,293,000; for assistance to other organizations and educational institutions that train

Norma Talmadge, who reached the

Red Cross nurses and workers, \$200,000; for Roll Call assistance furnished to chapters, \$190,000; for unforeseen contingencies, \$100,000.  
Less than \$500,000 is set aside for management in the national organization. The ratio of management expense to the total expenditure last year was five and two-tenths per cent, and it is expected that the ratio this year will fall below five per cent.  
In the budget for foreign operations, the items for the child health program in Europe and medical and hospital supplies for Russia represent more than two-thirds of the entire foreign allotment. The child health program gets \$641,314.10, but this is the balance of funds contributed to the American Red Cross specifically for this purpose. The \$1,834,044.83 for Russian supplies is the balance of funds made available by the Red Cross for medical and hospital relief in the famine-stricken areas of that country, and this money is expended under the directions of the American Relief Administration.  
Of the remainder of the foreign operations budget, \$928,718.15 there is appropriated for the liquidation and completion of general Red Cross relief activities in Europe \$600,000 which includes the expense of relief work among thousands of Russians quartered in Constantinople. For as-

istance to the League of Red Cross Societies, \$200,000 is set aside. The balance of the foreign funds provides \$108,000 for Junior American Red Cross projects in Europe; \$5,718.15 for the Warsaw training school for nurses, which represents contributions to the Red Cross restricted to this purpose, and lesser amounts for continuing the work inaugurated by the American Red Cross in Posen, Prague and Bulgaria at training schools for nurses.  
The Red Cross must depend chiefly upon its volunteer membership for financial support and service. In its appeal for the maintenance of strength through a full enrollment during the annual roll call campaign Armistice Day (Nov. 11) and Thanksgiving Day (Nov. 30) inclusive, the American Red Cross presents in its annual financial statement its evidence of unlimited work in the service of all mankind at the lowest cost commensurate with adequate standards.
