Lead World in Corn Production. Approximately 80 per cent of the corn entering into world trade comes from Argentina and the United States, according to information compiled by the United States Department of Agriculture.

In 1921 shipments from the United States exceeded those from Argentina by 21,000,000 bushels, but prior to that year Argentina was usually the larger shipper, average exports from that country before the war (1900-1913) having been between one-third and one-half of all corn entering into world trade and about two and one-half times the quantity exported by the United States.
