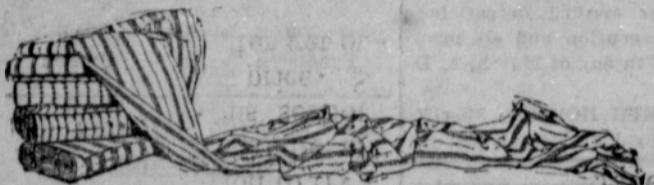

Ed. Gogel of Redmond, has purchased the E. S. Taylor ranch.

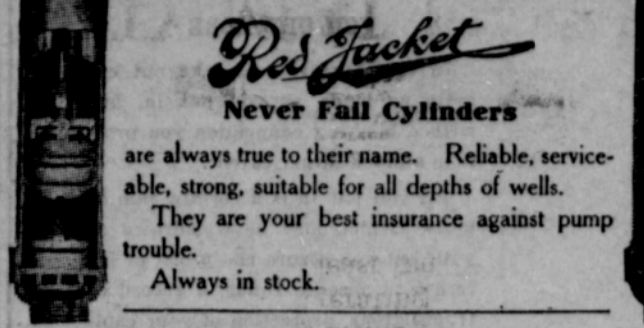

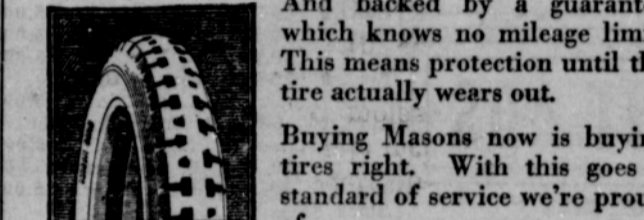

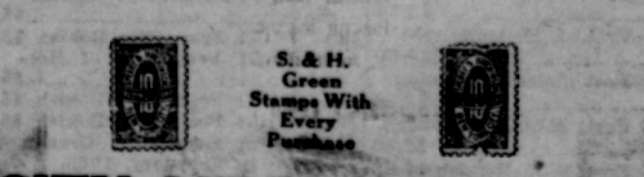
