**FAMOUS OLD WARSHIP IS SENT TO BOTTOM**

Panama Bay.—Amid strains of the Star-Spangled Banner and the firing of national salutes the old battleship Iowa sank here. After a shelling by the superdreadnaught Mississippi's 14-inch rifles, the battered hulk turned slowly over on its side and slid beneath the waves.

Secretary Denby, members of the congressional party, naval officers and observing ships' companies stood at attention in silent tribute to the once gallant vessel that won fame in the destruction of Cervera's fleet at Santiago.

With this dramatic climax the winter maneuvers of the United States fleet ended. For part of two days the Iowa withstood the battering from the Mississippi, which was using thin-walled shells, but her end came within seventeen minutes after the superdreadnaught opened up with service shells from a range of approximately nine miles.

Flood waters backed up from the Missouri river by a huge ice jam covered lowlands in Sioux City.

Without a dissenting vote or opening debate, the Iowa house of representatives passed an anti-mask bill.

The American delegation to the Pan-American congress, headed by Henry P. Fletcher, has arrived in Santiago.

Governor Moore of Idaho requested the resignation of Otto M. Jones as state game warden, to be effective April 1.

The French troops in the Ruhr will be reinforced by 20,000 men. War Minister Magnot announced in the chamber of deputies.

Willis H. Booth of the Guaranty Trust company, New York, was elected president of the International Chamber of Commerce in Rome.

Combat Mistrust, is Plea of Hughes.

Washington, D. C.—A plea that nations get themselves forcibly to the task of removing every remnant of suspicion, distrust and hatred and earnestly seek the cure for their ills, which is found only in friendship and good faith, was made by Secretary Hughes in a message to the fifth Pan-American conference in Santiago, Chile, delivered by Ambassador Henry P. Fletcher, head of the delegation from the United States. Mere formal arrangements between nations, the message said, are futile in the absence of good will.

trymen give the salts once each month. The amount of salts given is dissolved in enough water to mix a moist mash. Salts is necessitated at times due to limited range, limited green feed and general off-feed conditions. This practice is neglected many times because the poultry keeper is uncertain regarding the amount to administer to chicks of various ages. This question is debatable but the following amounts for different age chicks is dependable, safe and effective. 3 to 5 weeks, 3 ounces; 5 to 10 weeks, 4 ounces; 10 to 15 weeks, 5 ounces; 4 to 6 months, 6 or 8 ounces; 6 to 12 months and older, 8 to 12 ounces, for each 100 fowls.

**LARGE INCREASE IN INCOME TAX**

Washington, D. C.—Evidence of prosperity, almost nation wide, was given in the last income and profits tax payments to the government, treasury officials declared, basing their statement on figures which, although incomplete, support their earlier estimate of receipts of \$400,000,000 between March 1 and 15.

One of the reasons given for the view that business conditions improved throughout last year and are continuing on the upgrade was that although the general level of federal tax rates has been lowered as compared with the rates upon which last year's payments were based, treasury figures indicate the aggregate amount of taxes collected during the first half of March this year will far exceed the collections for the same period last year, when they totaled about \$336,000,000. Reports to the treasury showed that this amount had been exceeded probably by \$50,000,000.

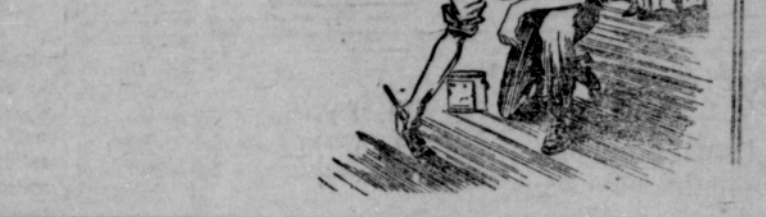
