**Gottland.**

**Glass Thunderbolts.**  
 An exhibition of "petrified thunderbolts" may be viewed by visitors to the American Museum of Natural History in New York. Technically they are known as fulgurites, and the officials of the museum have decided that there are several million persons in the United States that have worried along for years without knowledge of fulgurites.  
 Dr. O. E. Hovey of the museum's department of geology explained that a fulgurite is a glass which is often produced when lightning strikes a mass of rock or a bed of dry sand and melts the material beneath the impact. In other words, it is glass made by nature in very much the same way that men make glass in glass foundries. The fulgurites in the museum come from all sorts of places—Mt. Ararat, the desert of Sahara, Michigan, Illinois and Mehemambaka.
