Lake of Fire Ever Active. The great spectacle of Halemauana, popularly known as the "Lake of Everlasting Fire," in Hawaii National park, is again to be seen. In May, 1921, the boiling lava rose slowly until within 40 feet of the rim of the crater. Then earthquakes opened subterranean vents and the surface subsided at the rate of a foot an hour until the whole lake disappeared, leaving a rumbling smoking chasm 1,000 feet deep and nearly 2,000 feet across. During this sinking the walls of the pit, lacking the support of the living lava, began to collapse. During the subsidence the old craters of Makapuhi and Napau became active, but did not continue long. They are now dried out again.

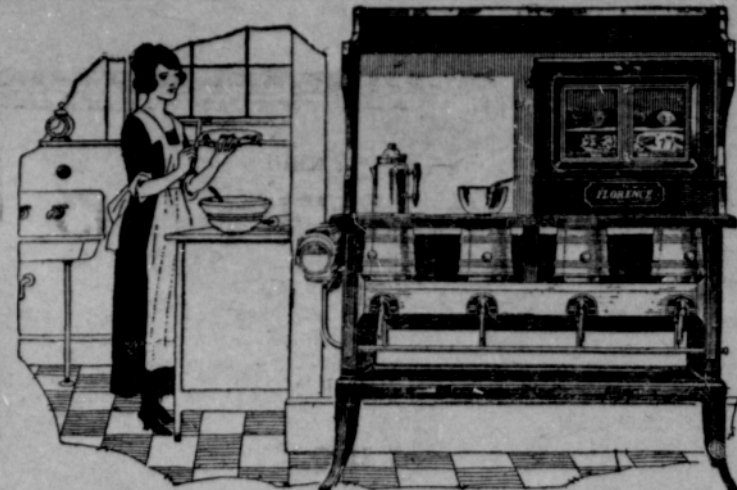
