ORDINANCE No. 110
An Ordinance to Provide for the Parking of Vehicles and Amending Section 16 of Ordinance No. 104. The City of Hermiston does ordain as follows:
Sec. 1. That Ordinance No. 104 passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor on April 20, 1921, be and the same hereby is amended so that section 16 thereof shall read as follows:
"Sec. 16. It shall be the duty of every person desiring to stop a vehicle upon any street of the City, unless otherwise provided for in Ordinance No. 104, to park the vehicle. No person shall park a car or vehicle except on the right hand side of any street so that one front wheel and one back wheel shall be placed at not to exceed one foot from the curb and the vehicle or car shall stand parallel with the curb line upon all streets of the City, and shall be placed so that the car or vehicle shall occupy no part of more than one space, in cases where the spaces for parking are marked on the curbs. All vehicles receiving or discharging a heavy load shall be permitted to park with hind wheels at the curb line. No truck of more than 16 feet in length overall, nor car or truck with trailers shall be permitted to park on Main street between First and Third streets, on First street between Main street and Gladys avenue, on Gladys avenue between First street and the O-W. R. & N. R. R. tracks or on Hermiston avenue between the O-W. R. & N. R. R. tracks and Third streets."

Sec. 2. Whereas it is necessary for the preservation of the peace, health and safety of the inhabitants of the City that this ordinance should become immediately effective, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the council and approval by the Mayor.

"JUST LIKE DADDY," AN ECONOMIC FORCE

SKILLED IN "HIGH FINANCE"
Employee's Story Should Have Warned Banker That He Was Unsafe Man to Have Around.

A neighbor of mine dropped in at meal time recently to tell me of a St. Louis banker friend who met in a self-serve restaurant one of his own employees. As the banker and his clerk sat munching their simple rations, the employee happened to look at his watch.
"Handsome watch, that," remarked the banker.
"Yes," replied the clerk, "it is a nice watch. Funny thing about that, too"—and he went on to tell how he happened to buy the watch. It seems that he was short of money at a roadhouse one night and was obliged to cash a check for \$40, though he chanced at that moment to have no funds to his credit. The next morning he tried to borrow money to deposit before the check should come in, but was unable to raise more than \$5. While wondering what to do, he happened to see the sign of an installment jewelry place. There he bought a \$75 watch on a down payment of \$5—after proving that he had a good business connection—and a few minutes later he pawned the watch for \$40, which he promptly deposited against the check of the night before.
"I should immediately have discharged the fellow," the banker said, in telling the clerk's story. "He was too slick a man to have around a bank. But I didn't, and now—well, sure enough, last week he got away with \$23,000."—Fred C. Kelly in The Nation's Business.

ISOLDE WAGNER'S DAUGHTER
German Courts Settle Dispute as to Legitimacy of Offspring of Famous Musician.

Fran Isolde Biedler, the eldest daughter of Richard Wagner, was born fifty-six years ago, although her mother, Cosima, was legally the wife of Hans von Bülow, the composer and pianist. In the period preceding Isolde's birth, Cosima, Wagner and Bülow lived together, but Wagner always regarded Isolde as his daughter, and named her after the favorite of his opera characters. Isolde became the wife of Johann Biedler, a well-known German orchestra leader. Several years ago she defended her illegitimacy in court, when her sister Eva sought to deprive her of any share in the Wagner estate on the ground that Isolde was the daughter of Bülow, not of Wagner. Eva is the wife of Houston Stewart Chamberlain, an English author, who is a naturalized citizen of Germany, and who, during the late war, received the Iron Cross from the ex-kaiser as a reward for his bitter attacks on England, published in the German magazines.

Frau Cosima testified to her belief that Bülow was the father of Isolde, but the courts decided that Isolde is Wagner's daughter.

"Like Daddy"—these two words, that express the imitative nature of children, occur to me as I think of our parental responsibilities in respect to both the thriftiness and the thriftiness of our boys and girls. The accent belongs on both aspects of the case, for we have yet to find a person who is the perfect example of thrift. Even Ben Franklin admitted his lack of attainment after his years of self-admonishment and self-criticism—and his temptations were not so great as those of today. Every reader will admit his deficiency in thrift. So will I. And what of our children? Will they copy us? Will their attitude toward thrift be "like Daddy's"? Will it be thrifty or thriftless?
It will at least be largely influenced by it. The thrift of the next generation is in the hands of the present. If our children are "out of hand" on their habits, whom have we to blame but ourselves?
Remember this: The next generation will be subject to the same laws of economics, the same rules of success, the same principles of happiness, as prevail today. A habit of thrift is one of the best possible characteristics we can mould into our children's natures during their habit-forming years. Its value will be apparent throughout maturity, whatever their lot, whether at the helm of large enterprise or steering the more humble affairs of a home.
Thrift will be the basic principle in the economic life of our nation and its system of producing and exchanging commodities. Thrift is always both of social and of individual advantage. Each day finds us expanding both in breadth and in depth of our resources of enjoyment and our opportunities for service as we practice thrift.
But how shall we bring about habits of thrift? Is there any other way than by teaching, whether by direct precept or by the unconscious example of our own habits, continually impressing themselves on the receptive minds of the young?
"Like Daddy" expresses one of the most powerful social and economic forces there is.
