J. M. Biggs and family left the first of the week for the Willamette valley.

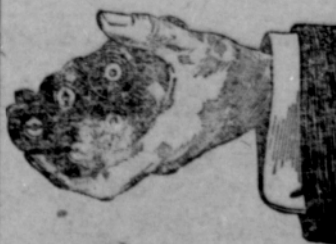

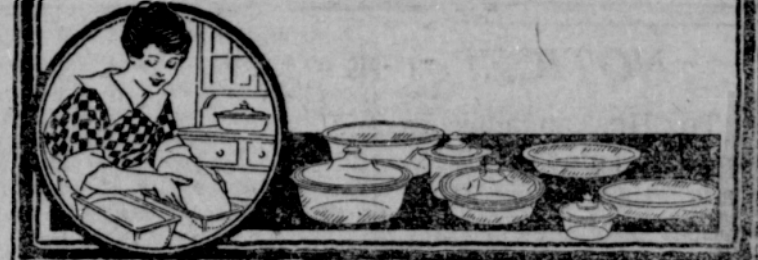
