**ORDINANCE NO. 110**

An Ordinance to Provide for the Parking of Vehicles and Amending Section 16 of Ordinance No. 104. The City of Hermiston does ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. That Ordinance No. 104 passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor on April 20, 1921, be and the same hereby is amended so that section 16 thereof shall read as follows:

"Sec. 16. It shall be the duty of every person desiring to stop a vehicle upon any street of the City, unless otherwise provided for in Ordinance No. 104, to park the vehicle. No person shall park a car or vehicle except on the right hand side of any street so that one front wheel and one back wheel shall be placed at not to exceed one foot from the curb and the vehicle or car shall stand parallel with the curb line upon all streets of the City, and shall be placed so that the car or vehicle shall occupy no part of more than one space, in cases where the spaces for parking are marked on the curbs. All vehicles receiving or discharging a heavy load shall be permitted to park with hind wheels at the curb line. No truck of more than 16 feet in length overall, nor car or truck with trailers shall be permitted to park on Main street between First and Third streets, on First street between Main street and Gladys avenue, on Gladys avenue between First street and the O-W. R. & N. R. R. tracks or on Hermiston avenue between the O-W. R. & N. R. R. tracks and Third streets."

Sec. 2. Whereas it is necessary for the preservation of the peace, health and safety of the inhabitants of the City that this ordinance should become immediately effective, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the council and approval by the Mayor.

**SOME HARD FACTS ABOUT SOFT MONEY**

When a farmer takes his product to market and sells it for, say, a dollar a bushel, he is dependent upon the honesty of two measures—the dollar and the bushel.

The other day a crossroads storekeeper got sent to jail for manipulating a trick bushel basket with a false bottom that would slide up and down in a way that was grand, gloomy and mysterious. When using it to measure stuff he bought from a farmer, he'd secretly shove the bottom down until it held at least a bushel and a quarter, but he would only credit him with a bushel. The buying power of the farmer's product was thereby depreciated by about twenty per cent.

Finally the farmers thereabouts got wise to the fact that the only way they could get what was coming to them was to enforce a reliable standard of measurement. So they put a good stiff jail penalty on using a false measure, laid for that storekeeper with the trick basket and sent him to prison.

Politicians in Europe have been manipulating the other measure—the money measure—in much the same way. Some of them in America want to tamper likewise with the dollar. Here is about the way it would work out. Suppose, when the farmer brought his product to market, the basket measure was honest enough and he got a dollar bill for each bushel. He'd take his dollars home and save them. Perhaps he planned to buy some land next his own for a thousand dollars, and figured that in a year or so he could make it.

But meanwhile the politicians start to manipulate the base of the currency. They would change it from the gold standard to a fiat money plan—from a gold guarantee to the mere say-so of the government that a piece of paper was worth a dollar. The farmer wouldn't be watching the money-politicians. He would be too busy raising things. At the end of the year he has his thousand dollars. He takes them to the landowner and says, "I'll buy your land now—here's a thousand dollars."

particularly good. The 1913 mortgage is now due—20,000 marks are to be paid. Marks are quoted 120,000 to the dollar. Twenty-thousand marks, one-sixth of that, therefore equal one-sixth of a dollar—16 2/3 cents. On the theory that "a mark is a mark," the debtor could wipe off his \$5,000 mortgage for 16 2/3 cents—less than the value of a dozen eggs.

That is, he can unless the pipe dream comes to a sudden end. For one thing the German courts are ruling that the theory "a mark is a mark" doesn't go—that a debtor has to give back a fair equivalent for what he received and that present paper marks worth 120,000 to the dollar are not the fair equivalent of former gold marks at four to the dollar.

Furthermore all pipe dreams are too good to be true. They are not what they seem. The smoke is wearing off in Germany and they are coming down to earth with a dull thud. It is beginning to be realized that the net result of a paper money nightmare is that producers are robbed and speculators enriched. Farmers are unable to raise prices for their products fast enough to keep up with the falling purchasing power of unsound money. The value of such money slips away from them like a handful of dry sand. It brings back to them less in purchases than they gave of their products to get it.
