MANY KILLED IN DUESSELDORF RIOT

Great German Separatist Demonstration Terminates in Shooting Affray.

Dusseldorf.—It was variously estimated that from 10 to 15 persons were killed and that between 200 and 300, many of them women and children, were injured during the disorders at the separatist demonstration Sunday. The trouble began at 4 o'clock in the afternoon when 40,000 persons, including 15,000 manifestants, had assembled in the square. The panic-stricken crowd fled for safety immediately the shooting began, trampling women and children.

The firing originated from the houses overlooking the square, but rapidly degenerated into a general shooting affray, in which the police, communists and separatists took part. The French occupation authorities held the German military police—the security police—responsible for the outbreak declaring that they started the shooting, in which the communist groups later joined. The hospitals and police barracks were filled with wounded, and French military doctors were rendering all possible assistance.

BUYING OF WHEAT BY U. S. FAVORED

Washington, D. C.—Revival of the United States Grain corporation, with authority to purchase 200,000,000 bushels of wheat in the open market, is the plan most favored by the Coolidge administration for the relief of the agricultural industry, it was learned here.

The purchase price would be \$1.50 a bushel, if the plan is finally adopted. Its supporters contend it would bring immediate stabilization to the wheat market and provide immediate financial relief for poverty-stricken agriculturists.

Legal barriers, however, may prevent revival of the corporation as it existed during the war, but a similar body would be organized under the plan.

The pilgrimage to the capital of a little group of bankers and farmers from the northwest, regarded at first as rather a futile effort, has resulted, after two days of conference with administration officials, in stirring the government to take definite action for relief in wheat growing states.

They came demanding an extra session of congress to revive the United States grain corporation. While they will not get that, they will return to the northwest carrying very definite assurances that all efforts will be bent toward bringing relief.

REBELLION NEAR BERLIN

Reinforcements From Capital Put Down Attempt to Secure Garrison.

London.—A revolutionary movement originated by nationalist organizations has broken out at Kuestrin, fifty miles from Berlin, says a Reuter's dispatch from the German capital. The insurgents attempted to disarm the garrison and occupy the fortress, but the commander of the reichswehr arrested the nationalist leaders and drove back the attackers.

It is officially announced in Berlin that the participants in the insurrection at Kuestrin, numbering about 400 men, have been captured and disarmed. The rebels lost one killed and several wounded. There were no losses among the government forces.

In the opinion of officials the revolt actually served a useful purpose, inasmuch as it gave notice that the government was prepared to put down immediately any attempts at insurrection.

Election Held Despite Governor. Oklahoma City, Okla.—Oklahoma's special state election, at which to decide the question of whether the state legislature shall meet to consider impeachment charges against Governor J. C. Walton, was held despite threat of the governor to prevent a vote. Johnston county appeared to be the only place in the state where the threat of Governor Walton to close the polls by force of arms had been carried out.

American Aviator Takes British Cup. Cowes, Isle of Wight.—Lieutenant David Rittenhouse of the United States navy, driving his Curtiss navy racer at a speed of 177.33 miles an hour, won the Schneider cup from its English holder against a field which had simmered down to another American, an Englishman and a Frenchman.

Lloyd George Gets Rousing Send-off. London.—David Lloyd George was given a stirring send off by members of the American society who gave a luncheon in his honor on the eve of his departure for a tour of Canada and the United States.

Rattlesnakes. Mustard gas, phosgene and chlorine, deadly accomplishments of war, will be turned upon large dens of rattlesnakes in the vicinity of San Marcos, Tex. The experiment is to be made by special order of the chief of medical warfare, Washington—Scientific American.

TIME TO VIEW WITH ALARM

Startling Exploit of Pennsylvania Girl Whose Flange Was in the Sheriff's Custody.

Had an Opponent, a Chambers of a McGrath written a tale a few years ago of a girl who freed her way into a sheriff's home and then, single-handed, freed her fiancé from the nearby jail with the aid of the keys and a revolver she obtained in her housebreaking, readers would have been amused at the idea a girl could do such a thing.

But truth continues to make fiction look silly. And times have changed. The Warren (Pa.) girl who did that thing is a type that the writers of shockers have not caught up with as yet. There are policewomen and women deputy sheriffs today—also girl bandits. Mildred, her emancipated state both enforces the laws and breaks them. Nobody is too much for her.

If the facts in this case were as they are told, here was love laughing at the locksmiths and the sheriff and all the embattled array of the forces of law and order. That's the way the movie scenario writers would look at it. Many other persons will take that judicial attitude toward the exploit of this lass, too.

But are not the ladies going a bit too far? Nobody, not even judges and juries, have objected very strenuously so far to women shooting up their husbands at odd times, even to their shooting up other people's husbands. But if they are to be permitted to break open the jails to get their chosen ones out of duress, of what use will be jails or policemen or laws, even?—Buffalo Evening News.

ECUADOR PINEAPPLES HUGE

They Grow to Weight of Twenty-Five Pounds in the Province of Esmeraldas.

Ecuador is fast becoming a great fruit-growing country, said Frank Edward Kink of Esmeraldas, Ecuador, to the New York Times.

"Pineapples grow to a weight of 25 pounds in the province of Esmeraldas," he declared. "This is about twice the size of the pineapples grown in Hawaii and shows that we must have very superior soil. Moreover, there is no place in the world that produces such large, thin-skinned, seedless oranges."

"Indications are that the province has also a considerable wealth in oil. There are a great number of oil seeps which would indicate a great production of high-quality oil. The character of this oil is higher than the famous Pennsylvania oil, and has been produced in Ecuador for the last 300 years, but it is only recently that modern machinery has been used for drilling, with excellent success. One month ago an English company brought in a well of 300 barrels an hour, of 38 gravity oil. These conditions combine to encourage immigration, which is steadily increasing in Esmeraldas."
