Man-Killing Horse.

What is said to be the strangest manslaughter case ever tried in the criminal courts of the United States is scheduled to be heard in Middlebury, Vt., in the near future. William Hallock, a farmer, is to face a jury on the charge of being responsible for the death of A. W. Woodcock an eighty-year-old neighbor. The defendant is the owner of a stallion which broke away and entered the yard of Woodcock, attacking and killing him before any one could come to his aid. The state will contend that Hallock was directly responsible in that he was negligent in not keeping a vicious animal properly restrained. The horse was permitted the freedom of its own barnyard, it is said, but broke from the yard, trotted down the highway and entered the open gate of Woodcock's place. It first attacked Floyd Woodcock and was beaten off with a pitchfork. It then approached the old man, striking him down with its hoofs, causing injuries which resulted in his death.

for the purpose of avoiding the contract. Washington and Oregon state associations are to market the combined product so as to eliminate competition. This can be arranged without violating any law and should by all means be worked out as has been by the eleven cotton state associations and by the several tobacco associations, and as it has been worked out by the potato state associations. Competition among individual producers is responsible for our present demoralized market condition, and as it will be much easier to coordinate the sale of hay through the association of Oregon and Washington than to secure the cooperation of the individual growers, the two states should by all means coordinate their sales.
