The following is the form and number in which the ordinance proposed by the Common Council will be printed on the official ballot:

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF HERMISTON BY THE COMMON COUNCIL.

Charter amendment limiting the assessment, to be levied for street improvements to the actual cost thereof as apportioned to the property benefitted and to authorize the council by ordinance or agreement with property owners to provide for paying all or part of any street im- provements from the general tax funds.

The full title and text of such measure is as follows:

ORDINANCE No. 111

An ordinance to amend subdivisions 11 and 14 of Section 102 of the Charter of the City of Hermiston and to submit and refer this ordinance to the voters of said City for the approval or rejection.
The City of Hermiston does ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. That subdivision 11 of section 102 of the Charter of the City of Hermiston be, and the same hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

Subdivision 11. No lot, part there- of or parcel of land shall be assessed for any local or special improve- ment in excess of the actual cost of such improvement as apportioned to said land and in just proportion to the cost of the entire improvement of the local improvement district in which such land is situated, except upon the express consent of the owner of such land, or his duly author- ized agent, first obtained in writ- ing.

Sec. 2. That subdivision 14 of Section 102 of the charter of the City of Hermiston be, and the same hereby is amended so as to read as follows:

Subdivision 14. Where the esti- mated assessment against any lot, part of lot or parcel of land for any local improvement appears to the common council as excessive or out of proportion to the special benefits to be derived by the property by reason of such local improvement, and where the improvement of a street in any local improvement district appears to the council to be of general benefit and value to all the inhabitants of the city, the common council may, by ordinance appropri- ate a sufficient amount from the general tax or special tax funds of the City to pay for so much of the cost of such local improvements as shall not be provided for by assess- ment upon the property specially benefitted by such improvement, and the council may, by agreement with the property owners in any local im- provement district, provide for pay- ment by the City of a just and fair proportion of the cost of improving any street or roadway within the City. The council shall also have the power and authority to create a special fund of the City for the purpose of paying all or such por- tion of any street improvement as it may deem just and fair to the City and to the property owners spe- cially benefitted thereby, and also for the purpose of keeping the streets so improved in repair. The council may by ordinance whenever ex- pedient or necessary to complete any street improvement undertaken by it, authorize the issuance of war- rants in payment thereof and fix the terms and conditions of pay- ment by the City and by the property owners specially benefitted by any such improvement.

Sec. 3. All acts or parts of acts in conflict herewith are hereby re- pealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall be re- ferred to the voters of the City of Hermiston for their approval or re- jection.
