CITY OF HERMISTON RESOLUTION Whereas the City Council does deem it expedient and necessary to improve that portion of Hurlburt Ave. n the City of Hermiston, lying between the property line at First Street and the property line at Fourth Street by grading and surfacing the same with gravel or crushed rock, and has required of the City Engineer plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement, and estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, and whereas the City Engineer has filed such plans, specifications and estimates in the office of the City Recorder, now, therefore, IT IS RESOLVED BY THE CITY OF HERMISTON that the plans, specifications and estimates for such street improvement be and the same hereby are approved and adopted, and that the City do hereby declare its intention to improve said part of Hurlburt Ave. at a probable cost of \$2515.00, and does hereby establish Local Improvement District No. 1 embracing all the property specially benefitted by such improvement as follows: All the land between the termini of such improvement abutting upon the said part of Hurlburt Ave. proposed to be improved, extending on either side from the marginal line of such street back to the center of the blocks abutting on said part of Hurlburt Ave. proposed to be improved; and, for the purpose of apportioning the cost of improving the cross sections of streets contained in said Local Improvement District No. 1, does hereby establish
