THE CALL OF THE HOME

On January 6, 1883, there was a picturesque gathering at the cemetery of St. George, Algiers, northern Africa, when a little group of representatives of the United States government, diplomats of foreign lands, and many Arabs in the rich robes of the Orient, gathered around a lonely grave. Reverently the remains of a distinguished American were disinterred and conveyed to a French cruiser bound for Marseilles. Here they were removed to an American liner which immediately sailed for the port of New York.

As the vessel rounded Sandy Hook and proceeded up the bay a great throng of people began to move to dock the remains of the wandering citizen were conveyed to a place of honor and a procession formed which moved through one of the principal thoroughfares of the city. As the line proceeded through the crowded streets the unnumbered thousands uncovered as a silent tribute to the famous dead.

In due time the remains reached cortege was formed to accompany them to the final resting place in Oak Hill cemetery. The procession was preceded by the marine band and the president of the United States the members of his cabinet, the justices of the supreme court and members of congress, together with tens of thousands of American citizens, joined to pay a reverent tribute.

The place where the impressive ceremony occurred in Oak Hill cemetery is one of the most beautiful spots of the capitol city. Attractive walks and drives as they wind through the verdant green are shadowed by giant trees. A marble monument fourteen feet in height commemorates the memory of him who lies buried there. At the left of this shaft is a slab of marble, brought from the lonely grave in Algiers. Its surface is now worn by the elements but the words are clear and distinct, "In Memory of Col. John Howard Payne."

Who was John Howard Payne and what did he do that such signal honors should have been accorded to him by the people of this great republic? He apparently was neither a statesman nor a soldier; neither an orator nor a scholar; neither an artist nor a genius; neither a financier nor a builder; all of which unite in making difficult and complicated a reply to the question. It will be necessary, therefore, to look deeper into the mysteries of life.

John Howard Payne, while sitting in a small room in the upper story of a lodging house near the Palais Royale in Paris, reproduced in

words the promptings of his own tired heart for the home of his youth. These words condensed in two verses of four lines each and blended with a melody taken from an old Sicilian vester, brought to light a new song which immediately became immortal.

It has been translated into the language of every civilized country on earth; it has gripped the hearts of countless millions; it has quickened the step and made courageous contending armies; it has stayed the hands of greed and made strong and effective the patriotic impulse of thinking people of all nations.

"Home, Sweet Home" is the greatest song ever written. It will live as long as the flag of our country unfurls its folds to the breeze. As the world grows older its grip upon human affection will grow stronger. The ability of Adellina Patti to render it made secure her fame as a prima donna. When this gifted woman appeared at the White House to sing before President Lincoln he requested this song and before it was finished it was observed that tears were trickling down the rugged face of the great war president.

It was Payne who succeeded in touching the magic chord of human affection for the memory of childhood's happy days. The love for this melody will dwell forever in the human heart and the fame of its author is securely fixed in the annals of the world. It was a new version of an old story. The selection of the plaintive words set to the old Sicilian tune have immortalized the basic principle of human progress—the eternal call of the home.

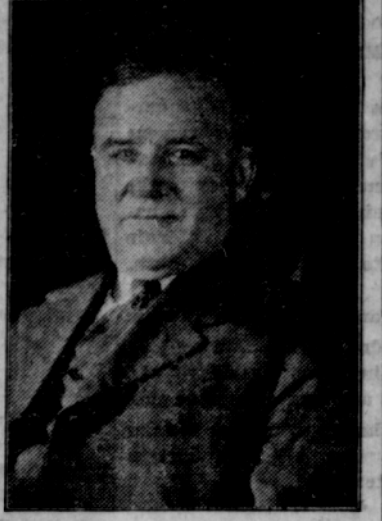
