Governor Issues Proclamation. Over Seventy Towns in State To Observe Day

All plans have been completed for the Defense Day program that will be put on in the Playhouse Friday, September 12.

Fred Steiwer, of Pendleton, has been secured as the speaker for the evening. His subject will be Good Citizenship. Mr. Steiwer's ability as a speaker is well known to the people of this community. He has a timely subject and his talk will be entertaining as well as instructive. The complete program is as follows:

Governor Pierce has issued a Defense Day proclamation and about seventy towns in the state have signified their intention of observing the day.

Below is the governor's proclamation.

PROCLAMATION

Executive Department, Salem, Ore.
Whereas, the President of the United States has set aside September 12, 1924, for a practical test of the Act of Congress, enacted in June, 1920, which provides for the security of our Nation; and

Whereas, that day is the anniversary of St. Michael in which thousands of our Oregon men fought in the defense of our land its liberties and is furthermore the anniversary of the writing of our National Anthem, the Star Spangled Banner; and

Whereas, participation in patriotic exercises and the test of our National Defense Law is in no sense militaristic but is a practical demonstration of loyalty, patriotism and the duties of American citizenship.

Now, Therefore, I, Walter M. Pierce, Governor of the State of Oregon, do proclaim September 12, 1924, as National Defense Test Day and do urge upon all citizens participation in the spirit of this National event in a manner commensurate with the proud traditions of the State of Oregon as "The Volunteer State."

In Testimony Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the State of Oregon to be hereunto affixed this 8th day of September A. D. 1924.

DAM SITE IS O. K. SAYS GOV. ENGINEER

ADDITIONAL MONEY NOT NEEDED IS DECLARATION

No Insurmountable Difficulties are Seen In Connection With Proposed Building

That the damsite for the Umatilla rapids project has been officially declared satisfactory and also that no insurmountable engineering difficulties have been encountered in connection with the project is stated in a letter from F. E. Weymouth, chief engineer of the reclamation service, to Congressman N. J. Sinnott. Mr. Weymouth also declares that the funds available are sufficient to complete the investigation and that his office "has no knowledge of any requirements for additional money."

Mr. Sinnott's letter, which was forwarded to the East Oregonian from The Dalles Monday is as follows:

Department of the Interior, Bureau of Reclamation, Denver, Colo. September 3, 1924.

Hon. N. J. Sinnott, The Dalles, Oregon.
My dear Mr. Sinnott:

Your letter of August 19th addressed to the Commissioner of the Bureau of Reclamation making inquiry in regard to the status of the Umatilla rapids work, has been referred to this office for reply.

Since the completion of the field investigations about April 1, the preparation of estimates and designs and the writing of the report have been in progress in this office. This work is now almost finished and it is expected that the report will be completed within the next few weeks.

The funds available for this work viz. the \$50,000 appropriated by congress and the \$10,000 appropriated by the state of Oregon will be sufficient to complete all work proposed for the present investigation, and this office has no knowledge of any requirements for additional money.

With regard to the suitability of the damsite, foundation conditions have been found satisfactory and no insurmountable engineering difficulties have been encountered. However, our estimates are not sufficiently complete to permit an opinion to be ventured as to the commercial feasibility of the proposition.

Mr. Sinnott has also communicated the news received to J. N. Teal, of Portland, president of the Umatilla Rapids Association. "The feasibility of the damsite is the important thing," says Mr. Teal, and he is now preparing to go ahead with the long contemplated meeting at Lewiston for the purpose of explaining the project plan to the people of that section of Idaho. No date has yet been set for the meeting at Lewiston.

WHITMAN AND OREGON AGGIE GAME SCHEDULED FOR OCT. 3

Two weeks after Pendleton's annual classic of the west, the Round-up has again become history. Round-up park with its spacious grandstand and bleachers will echo and reecho as the shrill staccato bark of football signals as two weeks before it had echoed and reechoed to the screams of wild horses, the bawling of Texas steers and the crack of starters' pistols. Then, too, there will be the organized yelling that only a real college football game can produce with real cheer leaders, those original Rah Rah boys to lead the partisans in their rooting. It has become, this annual football game in Pendleton, something of a classic itself and this year, with Whitman and the Oregon Aggies scheduled to tangle in a battle for gridiron supremacy October 3 will be no exception to the rule.

The game is of special interest for several reasons, in the first place it is Paul J. Schissler's debut as a coast conference coach and Schissler should be a wonder in this or any other conference. While at Lombard college Schissler established himself as one of the coming coaches drawn from a student body having but 143 men enrolled, was known as the "Red Tornado" and it blew over some of the strongest eleven in the middle west. Another reason that makes the O. A. C.-Whitman game particularly interesting is the fact that this is the first Aggie appearance in Pendleton since before the war when the O. A. C. machine joined battle with Tom Kelly's Idaho aggregation.

The game promises to be a real one for little Whitman is always well up in the running in the early season games and can give any western school a real battle at that time of the year. Of course it is impossible to say what O. A. C. will do but one thing is certain and that is that the Oregon Aggies will have a real attack this year. Even though it is an early season tilt, fans who journey to Pendleton will see Schissler unfold an attack that will threaten and pierce the Whitman line for "offense" is one of the main words in the new Aggie coach's vocabulary.

Schissler plays Notre Dame football, which means a lot of snappy end runs mixed with sparkling forward passes and totally unexpected line bucks. It is a surprise attack and one that keeps the spectators at attention, for the unexpected is always happening wherever Notre Dame football is played. Schissler has a splendid nucleus of former foot ball stars from which to form his team, while "Nig" Borleske has five veterans of his '22 team back and will have a real eleven on the field for Whitman.

FROM REAL ESTATE OFFICE TO BEAUTY PARLOR

Transformation Will be Effectuated in Former Office of E. P. Dodd, Pioneer Realtor

The real estate office of E. P. Dodd this week gave way to the new beauty parlor. The real estate business moved across the street and the carpenters went to work to prepare the old place for the splendid furnishings of the new business of manicuring and the making of Milady charming.

For fifteen years lands were sold and much of the settlement of the project was handled from this office. It was built by Skinner and Newport 18 years ago and was where they had their first office when promoting the east side of town townsite. Later it was owned by the late Col. H. G. Newport and was his office when he platted and sold the Newport Townsite Addition. Fifteen years ago E. P. Dodd entered this office and began the real estate business. Since then he has sold all of the Newport holdings, most of the Northern Pacific lands, 6000 acres of the old Maxwell lands which were bought by the Umatilla Farm Lands Co., and platted and sold the townsite of Boardman and platted the townsite of Cold Springs. The safe and furniture of the old Maxwell company used for many years in selling several thousand acres of that company's lands in early settlement belong to and were moved again by Mr. Dodd. The combined office furniture and records if they could speak could tell the story of three-fourths of the land sold and settled on the Umatilla project.

In addition they have sat in on nearly every political and public franchise that took place in the city's early history. Part of the furniture knew what they did across the track and part knew what they did on the other side. Part of it knows who paid \$40 per acre for land and part who paid \$200. Mr. Dodd has moved into the building across the street to the building where the Hermiston Herald was started.

BIG WEST SIDE RABBIT DRIVE IS SUNDAY

GOING UP!

"Going up!" That's what the elevator man says. That's what the Pacific International Live Stock Exposition might have chosen for its slogan.

Ever since it was founded it has been going up. Going up in numbers and excellence of exhibits, going up in attendance, going up in importance. This year its building went up in smoke.

But that didn't stop it or daunt it. A new building is going up. This new building is to follow in general the plan of the old one, but it is going up bigger and better than ever. The arena is to be larger than the old one and in better proportions. The seating capacity will be increased to 7000 and the arrangement of boxes and seats will be improved. The horse department will be larger and better equipped. The boys and girls clubs are to have a department all their own. The poultry show will be larger than the old one. Other minor but important improvements have been made in the plans.

The type for the premium list is going up now, and by September 15 or thereabouts it will be in the mails. It will show some changes but more premium money than ever will be placed temptingly before the exhibitors. The ashes were not cold before General Manager O. M. Plummer was talking with President E. A. Stuart over the long distance telephone, making arrangements for the new structure. A day had not passed before a man was figuring on the lumber for the new building. Before the week was gone work was begun on salvaging and clearing the ground. Today the financial arrangements are completed for the start and the new, great building, "bigger and better than ever" is "going up." Construction has started.
