RESIGNATION OF F. E. WEYMOUTH IS ANNOUNCED

Chief Engineer of the Reclamation Service Had Visited Project Several Times

The resignation of F. E. Weymouth as Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Reclamation was announced by Dr. Elwood Mead, Commissioner of Reclamation, at the Department of the Interior Sept. 19.

Mr. Weymouth has been induced to accept private employment at a greater salary, which is understood to be double what the government paid him. His long connection with the Federal reclamation work in responsible positions and wide acquaintance in the west will cause much regret at his departure.

Mr. Weymouth was born in Medford, Maine, June 2, 1874, and graduated from the university of that state in 1896 with the degree of bachelor in civil engineering. Three years later his alma mater conferred upon him the full degree of civil engineer. Ever since he has been in engineering work, for the first ten years in a variety of connections—city works in Massachusetts, water-works in Canada, canal surveys in Nicaragua and railroad work in South America, but his professional work has been mainly with the bureau of Reclamation and demonstrates that there are at times in the civil service opportunities for a career of dis-

tion. Six months after the reclamation act was passed in 1902 Mr. Weymouth was engaged by the Reclamation service and assigned to surveys in the west, mapping reservoir sites, canal routes and irrigable lands. When the Service began construction work he was assigned to that and built dams, canals and other works in the northwestern states. One promotion after another followed. One of his most notable achievements was the Arrowrock dam in Idaho, highest in the world, which was built under his supervision with a saving under the estimate of a year in time and a million dollars in cost. engineer in charge of work in Idaho. From the position of supervising and vicinity Mr. Weymouth was called to Denver in 1916 as chief of construction for all the reclamation work. In 1920 he was made chief engineer, supervising work in all the reclamation states, involving thousands of employees and the expenditure of millions of dollars annually in the investigation, construction and operation of irrigation systems. The regard in which Mr. Weymouth was held by his associates is expressed in the following letter from Dr. Elwood Mead, Commissioner of Reclamation, accepting his resignation:

Mr. F. E. Weymouth,
 Chief Engineer,
 Bureau of Reclamation.
 My dear Mr. Weymouth:

Your acceptance of private employment at a substantial increase of salary must be regarded as a deserved promotion and the organization of this Bureau will take pride in the fact, but your associates in the reclamation will also feel keenly the loss to the organization and to them personally. In my relatively brief connection with the Bureau I have learned how completely you have enjoyed the professional respect and personal affection of project officials and others connected with the work.

Your resignation, effective at the close of October, is therefore accepted with sincere regret that the government loses your services but with pleasure in the fact that their value is being recognized and with hearty best wishes for the future.

Rebuilding the Home of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition

Above are pictured the new buildings, August 23rd, just one month after the fire. When people heard that the Pacific International Live Stock Exposition at Portland had been destroyed, it was like a blow in the face. But the indomitable spirits who formed it first, who labored for its establishment and continuance were not daunted.

Within a few days, work had begun on a new home, "bigger and better than ever," and now it is nearing completion. The contractors have promised to have it done and ready for occupancy by October 25th, and the great Exposition will open its doors to the public on the morning of November 1st with a larger and more beautiful show than ever in its history.

The new structure is modeled in general after the old one, for the arrangement and plan of the former one was hard to beat. The stadium has been enlarged, however, and forty feet have been added to its length, and the seating capacity has been increased to 7000. The horse department has been enlarged and improved, as has the poultry department, while the boys' and girls' clubs will have a department exclusively for their exhibits. Magnificent animals from all over the United States will show what breeding and scientific care can do with the race of dairy cows. World record animals of various breeds are promised and the dairy department will not be surpassed anywhere in the world. The breeders of cattle vie with each other for numbers and excellence, and there is always a sportsmanlike struggle in the show ring between breeders for the coveted blue ribbons. Collected within the walls of the immense Exposition building are not only the finest dairy cattle to be found anywhere in the world, but hundreds of other animals, representing the time, labor and thought and work of centuries to bring them to as near perfection as the ingenuity of man can compass. Nor is this all. The products of the soil in their glory of color and fragrance, the accomplishments of the boys and girls in useful endeavor and other things worthy of study and enjoyment will be found at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, November 1 to 8 inclusive.
