Birds That Keep Up With the Progression

Many species of birds have shown that they are possessed of a progressive spirit that has prompted them to take advantage of improved conditions offered by the advance of civilization. Thus, says an exchange, the chimney swift, which before houses with chimneys were built, lived and built its nests in hollow trees, now usually finds chimneys more satisfactory and indefinitely safer.

The barn swallow, which formerly built its nest on a ledge on the side of some cliff or cave, a situation still sometimes utilized in the wilder parts of the country, now generally makes use of the rafters of barns as offering better protection both from the elements and his enemies.

The natural nesting place of the phoebe is a narrow ledge on the face of some cliff, but the greater majority now find that bridges, outhouses and other man-made structures offer more advantageous situations, and a pair is rarely found occupying the former site. The martins and wrens, which once nested in hollow trees exclusively, now prefer the bird boxes built by kindly human beings when they can find one before it's pre-empted by the ubiquitous English sparrow.
